Ashland Lodge No. 162 was organized Under Dispensation prior to August, 1847, chartered September 2, 1847. J. C. Williams, Master; Joseph Reynolds, Senior Warden; Henry Friederick, Junior Warden; R. G. Williams, Secretary; A. N. Hubbard, Senior Deacon; A. C. Dysart, Junior Deacon; W. H. H. Wilson, Steward and Tyler. Past Masters: J. C. Williams, James D. Carson, A. C. Dysart. Master Masons: Josiah B. Dysart, Joseph Miller, John R. Henderson, William Carson, A. M. Adams, James Sayers, David N. Lewis, Alfred Smith, M. R. Moore, Johnston Carson, Cyrus W. Farris. Fellow Crafts: Charles Kirtley, George W. Evans.

J. C. Williams, the first Master, is yet living(September 1, 1914), at the age of ninety-four, at Carthage, Illinois. All of these brothers are dead except J. C. Williams.

Charter was arrested October 16, 1857.

Ashland Lodge No. 370, was organized Under Dispensation
March 10, 1860, chartered October 18, 1860, with the following
officers: Milton Frazer, Master; James L. Joplin, Senior Warden;
C. A. Redd, Junior Warden; W. H. Kirtley, Secretary; R. G. Williams,
Treasurer; Wm. Sayers, Senior Deacon; B. K. Bethurum, Junior
Deacon; M. R. Moore, Steward and Tyler.

Past Masters: Milton Frazer, Chas. A. Redd, Rev. Chas. Kirtley.
Master Masons: Willis Adams, John Adams, William A. Brooks.

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Harrison Carpenter, William Carson, William M. Fish, William G. Hiatt, Bennett Hiatt, William Henderson, Henry B. Linville, John McClary, William McClure, Alfred Owens, Alfred Smith, Edward Shivell, Robert Snodgrass, David N. Williams, Johnson Wilson. All of these brothers have passed over the river.

Charter of Ashland No.370 was arrested in 1888 and reorganized as Ashland Lodge No. 640 March 7, 1889, and chartered October 24, 1889, with the following officers: James G. Carter, Master; Willis Griffin, Senior Warden; Noah H. Tyree, Junior Warden; James Maret, Secretary; Willis Adams, Senior Beacon; F. Logan Thompson, Junior Deacon; Henry C. Braughton, Steward and Tyler. Ashland Lodge formerly owned its building in connection with the Christian Church, the fraternity using the second story. Six or eight years ago its interest in this building was sold and the second story of the concrete building at corner of Main and Second streets was purchased and commodiously fitted up for fraternity uses, including various rooms and a dining hall.

John W. Brown, of this Lodge, who is one of the strong lawyers of Kentucky, is, under the present Grand Lodge administration, a member of the Judiciary Committee of the Grand Lodge, which is the committee having in charge the consideration of all questions of legal nature coming before the Grand Lodge.

MEETING CREEK LODGE NO. 641 MEETING CREEK, HARDIN CO., KY.

Charter was granted by the Grand Lodge on the 24th., day of October, 1889.

The Masonic Hall was dedicated November 20, 1890. Pending the dedication, the Lodge held a meeting in the Baptist Church just opposite the new hall. After the meeting closed, the members formed in procession, marched back to the hall and witnessed the dedicatory ceremonies by the officers of the Grand Lodge. Besides there and the members of Parkland Lodge, No. 628, there were visitors from other Masonic Lodges, and forty members from the Louisville Commandery No. 1. After the ceremonies were completed and the congratulations over, the members formed in procession and marched back to the Baptist Church where it opened Lodge on the M. M. degree. The Master, William H. Perrin, was present and being somewhat indisposed did not conduct the meeting. William H. Taylor acted Master at the opening of the Lodge.

Hall, was held there December 9, 1890, William W. Riggs acting Master. On the 27th., of December, the amual election of officers took place, and Dr. John W. Drake was elected Master of the Lodge for the year 1891. He endeavored to build up the Lodge as the former Master intended to do, but me twith little success. His term of office having expired he was re-elected Master for the year 1892, and strove hard to make his second term a successful one but failed. It can be said truly that he was a zealous Master and performed his duties well. Demits occasionally showed up, and delinquencies, and remittances kept the Lodge at a standstill, or rather on the ragged edge, some of the members ambitious

to hold the Lodge membership together, made arrangements to give literary entertainments for the good of the order at each regular meeting.

In 1891 Masonic interest had flagged to such an extent that the Lodge was on the verge of disbanding.

On the 27th., of December, three years and six months after the first regular election of officers, William B. Tate, one of the first petitioners for membership in the Lodge was elected and installed as Master of the Lodge. He immediately set himself to work to revive the interest of the Craft. He was prompt in attending all Lodge meetings, and his conduct and bearing cemented the brothers more closely together. He made it his duty to visit every member in sickness. Under his administration Parkland Lodge took a new lease on life, he was re-elected and his second term was a most successful one. He was satisfied with the work he had accomplished, and declined to take the office for another term. A rising vote of thanks was then extended to him and the following testimonial of his worth spread upon the minutes of the Lodge:

"Brother William Brown Tate, rendered efficient service during the past two years, 1892-94, as Master of the Lodge, during which time it had grown from an almost disbanded condition to one of strength and prosperity."

His successor, Herbert V. Harris, showed ability as Master of the Lodge in many ways. A short song service after the meetings was one of the features he introduced, which did much good towards building up its membership and keeping Lodge interest alive.

In 1899 the site on which the new Parkland Masonic Hall now stands, was purchased and paid for.

William A. Groves, who was elected to the Master's chair
by a hand some majority, exceeded the expectation of his friends;
he was awake, alert, and steadfast in his purpose to see the
Lodge prosper; a tireless and persistent hustler for the St. John's
Day League, he raised about \$9000.00 for the Masonic Widows' and
Orphans' Home in a day and a night.

The membership of the Lodge is now over four hundred.

This Lodge has established an Employment Bureau which looks after Masons out of employment and puts them in touch with those who seek employees. The jobless brother is thus helped to help himself. It is a noble work and noble men are doing it.

WOODSTOCK LODGE NO. 639
WOODSTOCK, PULASKI CO., KY.

Chartered October 24, 1899. Reports twelve members.

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This Lodge was granted a dispensation under the name of Hardin Lodge. First meeting under dispensation was held July 27, 1889, for the purpose of organizing the Lodge and installing its officers, when the following were elected and installed: Anderson S. Decker, Master; P. A. Cundiff, Senior Warden; Isaac Hicks, Junior Warden; Squire H. Reed, Treasurer; Jerry Adams, Secretary; Richard A. Goodman, Steward and Tyler.

This Lodge reported a membership of ten to the Grand Lodge of 1913.

In December, 1916, a storm swept the roof from the building in which the Lodge meetings were held and destroyed the Lodge Charter and most of the Hodge properties.

CROSSLAND LODGE NO. 642 CROSSLAND, CALLOWAY CO., KY.

Crossland Lodge No. 642, was organized October 24, 1889, with R. C. Williams, Master, John Nance, Senior Warden; William G. Moore, Junior Warden. In October 1897, the Charter was arrested by the Grand Lodge for non-payment of dues.

FREEDOM LODGE NO. 643 SUNNY BROOK, WAYNE CO. KY.

Chartered October 24, 1889. Reports fifty-one members.

CUBA LODGE NO. 644
CUBA, GRAVES CO., KY.

Chartered October 24, 1889. Reports twenty-eight members.

POWELL LODGE NO. 645 CLAY CITY, POWELL CO., KY.

Chartered October 3, 1890. Forfeited its Charter February 6, 1917, for non payment of Grand Lodge dues. This indebtedness having been fully paid, the Charter was restored March 9, 1917.

ROBERT CLARK LODGE NO. 646
SEXTON'S CREEK, CLAY CO., KY.

This Lodge was set to work under dispensation April 19, 1890, by J. F. Herd, of New Hope Lodge 564 acting as proxy of the Grand Master. The Charter members were: Thomas Kidd, W. M.; Charles Scott & Senior Warden, from 564; James Sandlin, Junior Warden, from, No. 564; W. M. Halcomb, Secretary, from No. 601; Robert Clark, Treasurer, from No. 564; Henry C. Sandlin, Senior Deacon, from No. 564; N. M. Clark, Junior Deacon, from No. 601; J. G. Halcomb from No. 601, H. J. Clark, Tyler, from No. 601.

Charter was granted October 18, 1890. The men who organized this Lodge were among the pioneer Masons of Clay County and of that hardy fiber of which strong men are made.

To build a suitable hall to house their new Lodge, these men had to haul lumber eleven miles, over a mountain road, in a wagon drawn by four oxen, and the oxen helped with hand spikes at many

places when the axles were hidden in the mud.

The Lodge was named for Robert Clark, its first treasurer, one of the Charter members, ex-sheriff of the county and one of the best beloved men in his section of the State.

This Lodge has ninety active members, meets in its own building, in a hall well supplied with suitable furniture and paraphernalia. With old men to teach and to advise, the active management of the Lodge is in the hands of young men who manifest a very great interest in things Masonic, and who have made the local organization a pronounced influence for good in the community and a source of pleasure and of pride to the Craft.

Flippin Lodge No. 647, F. & A. M., located at Flippin,
Kentucky was chartered October 3, 1890. Joseph H. Loyd, Master;
G. C. Gillenwaters, Senior Warden; E. T. Thomas, Junior Warden.
Charter members: C. H. C. Young, W. C. Brocket, Sam M. Jenkins,
W. H. Maxey.

The Loage rented the upper room of the public school building where it met from date of organization until January 23, 1904, on which date it met in its hall which had been purchased by a committee appointed on December 28, 1903.

VIENNA LODGE NO. 648
CALHOUN, McCLAIN CO., KY.

Chartered October 3, 1890, burned January 8, 1908. New Charter issued October 21, 1908. Reports one hundred and ten members.

BREATHITT LODGE NO. 649

JACKSON, BREATHITT CO., KY.

Chartered October 3, 1890. Reports two hundred and fifteen members.

COLUMBUS LODGE NO. 650 COLUMBUS, HICKMAN CO., KY.

Grand Master W. W. Clarke granted a dispensation on December 21, 1890, to eight petitioners, to establish a Lodge at Columbus to be called Columbus Lodge U. D.

The petitioners were: L. W. Schenk, Master; E. Rowley, Senior Warden; W. N. Ditto, Junior Warden; W. F. Cowles, Secretary; J. M. Gest, Treasurer; J. W. Williams, Senior Deacon; Wm. Rocker, Junior Deacon and H. F. Roberts, Tyler.

The Lodge was set to work by J. R. Owen, as proxy of the Grand Master, January 7, 1890. October 3, 1890 dispensation was continued for one year on request of members.

Charter was granted October 8, 1891.

BEVIS LODGE NO. 651
ALCORN, JACKSON CO., KY.

Bevis Lodge No. 651 was organized or set to work Under
Dispensation August 9, 1890 at the House of J. T. Lainhart near
Alcorn Post Office, Jackson County, by O. D. Henderson, Master
of Lodge 437, assisted by the following brethren: Charles Rice,
Senior Marden; James Flinn, Junior Marden; Andy Richardson,
Treasurer; W. L. Rice, Secretary; Ben Cox, Senior Deacon; James
Godey, Junior Deacon; Walter Richardson, Steward and Tyler.
The following officers of the new Lodge were then installed:
W. L. Harrison, Master; A. H. Williams, Senior Marden; W. B.
Hymer, Junior Warden; Elihu Rose, Treasurer; J. B. Harrison,
Secretary; Tyra Lainhart, Senior Deacon; Nat Rose, Junior Deacon;
J. T. Lainhart, Steward and Tyler.

Thus organized the new Lodge worked under dispensation until October 20, 1891, when it was set to work under Charter by John W. Fowler, Master of Indian Creek Lodge 614.

SYLVAN DELL, HARRISON CO., KY.

This Loage is located near Sylvan Dell, Harrison County, about eight miles North-east from Cynthiana, the county seat.

The Loage was organized and set to work by W. T. Lafferty, acting proxy for Grand Master Charles F. Fisk, in the year of 1890, with thirteen Charles rembers: Zack W. Lee, first Master; John E. Masters, first Senior Warden; Willoughby Harning, first Junior

Warden; David Alexander, first Secretary; Samuel W. Craycroft, first Treasurer, S. Thomas Lee, First Tyler.

Charter members: Zack N. Lee, John E. Masters, Willoughby Harning, David Alexander, John B. Colvin, William M. Lowe, William Smith, Nicholas C. Marsh, S. Thomas Lee, Samuel N. Crafcroft, James A. Smith, Moses Florence and Henry H. Harding, most of whom came from Orient Lodge No. 500.

The Lodge was named in honor of Samuel W. Craycroft who donatedd the site where the hall stands.

The meeting night is on Saturday on or before the full moon in each month.

A fact that is worthy to mention is that John S. Wagoner and seven sons are members of this Lodge.

ELLIOTT LODGE NO. 653 STARK, ELLIOTT CO., KY.

Elliott Lodge No. 653, was chartered October 8, 1891 with the following as Charter members: John A. Leedy, Jacob McDowell, H. C. Cox, M. H. Flanery, G. W. Renfroe, J. M. Porter, L. L. Goodman, W. A. Thompson, Flanery Horton, Huston Flanery, F. M. Mauk, J. H. Leedy, J. W. Rose, J. C. Kegley, D. G. Kegley, Wm. Mauk, R. D. Leadingham, Wm. Green, J. E. Cox, Willis W. Johnson, J. P. Creech, J. W. Barber, J. K. P. Horton, J. G. Whitt, A. B. Duvall, E. S. Leedy, J. C. Hay, J. J. Ross, J. M. Fraley, C. S. Bryant, Samuel Renfroe. The first of ficers were: W. A. Thompson, Master; J. H. Flanery, Senior Warden, H. C. Cox, Junior Warden.

Since this -odge has been instituted there have been admitted

and initiated eighty-seven members, making with Charter members a total of one hundred and eighteen, of this number there have been suspended twenty-nine, demitted forty-four, died twelve, present membership thirty-three.

Some of the members of this Lodge have held the highest offices in the county, viz: County Judge, Sheriff, County Attorney, and School Commissioner and member of the State Legislature.

The Lodge is located in a mountain farming district with bad roads and other inconveniences of travel, but with all of these disdvantages interest in Masorry is upon the average and attendance fairly good.

Granted dispensation March 4, 1891. First meeting held April 11, 1891. Chartered October 8, 1891.

The Charter members were T. W. Pirtle, W. P. Crume, G. L. Crume, B. F. Duvall, G. L. Hodges, M. N. Cralle, O. B. Funk, D. E. Shipley and R. L. Taber.

One of the Masters of the Lodge, J. K. Board, was educated at the Masonic Orphans Home and has served the County as Assessor and as a member of the Fiscal Court. I. F. Groves, a member of this Lodge, has been Sheriff of Hardin County, and C. L. Crume, another member, Clerk of the Hardin Circuit Court.

Chartered October 19, 1892, became defunct October 20, 1898.

WALLINS CREEK LODGE NO. 666 WALLINS CREEK, HARLAN CO., KY.

Organized under Charter from the Grand Lodge of Kentucky October 19, 1892, is situated in the beautiful little town of Wallins Creek, Kentucky, in the midst of the coal mining section of the State, its membership at present is forty-two.

The Lodge owns its meeting place and is in prosperous condition with Masonic enthusiasm wide awake.

Chartered October 19, 1892. Reports fifty-nine members.

ANDY BOWEN LODGE NO. 670 SPURLINGTON, TAYLOR CO., KY.

Chartered October 17, 1893. Reports nineteen members.

CROTONO LODGE NO. 671 CAYCE, FULTON CO., KY.

Chartered October 17, 1893. Burned July 1, 1906. New Charter granted October 17, 1906. Reports sixty-eight members.

CRESCENT LODGE NO. 672 INEZ, MARTIN CO., KY.

Chartered October 17, 1893. Reports fifty members.

CENTRAL LODGE NO. 673
CENTRAL CITY, MUHLENBERG CO., KY.

January 28, 1893, in Lacefields Hall over where H. Miller now conducts his tore, Central Lodge U. D., was set to work by R. W. Adams, commissioned to act as proxy for Grand Master, J. Speed Smith. The following were the first of ficers and Charter members: R. L. Hendrick, Master; J. J. Lancaster, Senior Warden; W. P. Scott, Junior Warden, T. L. Roll, Treasurer: R. W. Adams.

Secretary; M. T. Cain, Senior Deacon; S. J. Cates, Sr., Junior Deacon; W. A. Perkins, Steward and Tyler; M. P. Creel, B. F. Creel, W. W. Griffifth, L. N. Perkins, W. B. Smith, S. Lacefield.

October 24, 1893, J. W. Wheeldon, proxy of the Grand Master, set the Lodge to work under the name of Central Lodge No. 673. The Lodge held its meetings for a time in Lacefield's Hall, then in McDowell Hall, then in Morton's Hall. In the spring of 1904, it was planned to build a hall of its own which was carried into effect that year.

In growth and membership the Lodge has shown a steady increase. Only one member of this Lodge has held a Grand Lodge office. R. L. Hendrick(now deceased) having been appointed Grand Junior Deacon.

Of the original fourteen Charter members there only remain four, namely: T. L. Roll, M. T. Cain, W. W. Griffifth, S. J. Cates, The present membership is one hundred and twenty-six.

BIG SPRING LODGE NO. 674
BIG SPRING, MEADE CO., KY.

Chartered October 17, 1893, became defunct October 1896.

HARTFORD LODGE NO. 675
HARTFORD, OHIO CO., KY.

Dispensation was granted to Hartford Lodge by William B. Allen, Grand Master in the year 1847.

The Lodge was set to work by Hiram A. Hunter, Past Master of Owensboro Lodge No. 130, March the 31st, 1847.

R. G. Gardner was the first Master; W. J. Berry, Senior Warden; J. W. Lewis, Junior Warden; Thomas C. Taylor, Secretary; Erastus Smith, Senior Deacon; C. J. Kelly, Junior Deacon and Thomas Lawton, Steward and Tyler.

Charter was granted the new Lodge, under the name of Hartford Lodge No. 156, September 2, 1847.

Hartford Lodge No. 156 prospered for many years, many of its members were great and good men and Masons and their influence for good was felt throughout Ohio and adjoining counties, and at this date, all but three have gone to join that Lodge above where the Grand Master of the Universe presides.

For some unknown cause, the members became careless, lukewarm and indifferent, and for failing to pay Grand Lodge dues for the years 1882, 1883, 1884 and 1885, the Charter of the Lodge was arrested by Grand Master B. G. Witt, July 10th., 1886, and Hartford Lodge No. 156 was no more.

There was no Maso nic Lodge at Hartford from the year 1886 until the year 1892, when William H. Moore, Gabriel J. Bean, Joe B. Rogers, James Sullenger, Daniel F. Tracy, Thomas J. Smith, A. D. White, Louis Guenther, John C. Riley and H. Weinsheimer petitioned the Grand Lodge of Kentucky for a dispensation and Cromwell Lodge No. 420 recommended that same be granted.

Grand Master J. Speed Smith, is sued a dispensation on January the 18th., 1893, and deputized J. P. McKinney, J. P. Miller and Joe Harder to set the Lodge to work, and on Monday evening, April 3, 1893, they with a number of other brothers, organized

Hartford Lodge U. D., and the Lodge worked under dispensation until the 17th., day of October 1893, when a Charter was granted and the Lodge became Hartford Lodge No. 675, F. & A. M.

The first officers of Hartford Lodge No. 675 were William H. Moore, Master; G. J. Bean, Senior Warden; James Sullenger, Junior Warden; A. D. White, Treasurer; H. Weinsheimer, Secretary; S. F. Tracy, Senior Deacon; Louis Guenther, Junior Deacon and Joe B. Rogers, Steward and Tyler.

All of those have joined the Grand Lodge above, except William H. Moore, Joe B. Rogers and A. D. White.

The first petition for initiation was that of Doctor A. B. Baird, which was received on May 1, 1893, and he was accepted and initiated on June 5, 1893.

Hartford Lodge No. 675 is in its twenty-fourth year; twenty different members have served as Master during those years; W. N. Stevens having served two years and C. M. Crowe is now serving the fourth year.

Many of its members have held positions of honor and trust; many of them have been successful financially and professionally, and many of them are now among the leading professional and business men of the County and State.

The Lodge is in a prosperous condition, has a membership of one hundred, owns a one-half interest in lodge building(brick), which cost \$7,000.00; indebtedness about \$1400.00; has two regular monthly meetings(first and third Monday nights); brotherly love prevails and the brethren happy.

HAZARD LODGE NO. 676
HAZARD, PERRY CO., KY.

Hazard Lodge No. 676 was organized in 1893, with I. J. Ward, first Master, F. B. Feltner, First Senior Warden, and J. C. Boggs, first Junior Warden.

Hazard, at this time, was a very small town but composed of some good men who became interested in Masonic work, the Lodge grew slowly but surely, starting with thirty-five Charter members, the membership increased rapidly; then a demit was granted to establish Yerkes Lodge No. 857, thus lowering the membership, but because of increase in population and interest in Masonic work, the membership has increased to one hundred and six, composed of the best citizens of Perry County, who individually and collectively, and as a Lodge, has always stood for a high standard in society and has upheld the standard among its members which has been an incentive to the neighborhood to rise to higher things.

This Lodge has undergone many hardships and suffered heavy losses. The greatest of all was the loss of its temple by fire in 1909, together with furniture, working tools, and regalia. No insurance, hence a total loss. But the Charter was saved. The Lodge communications were then held in the court house where again its regalia was completely destroyed when the court house burned in 1911. The Lodge owns a lot worth perhaps \$3000.00, upon which to erect a Masonic Temple in the near future.

SACRAMENTO LODGE NO. 677 SACRAMENTO, McLEAN CO., KY.

Chartered October 17, 1893, having failed to make return and pay dues had its Charter arrested October 20, 1897.

HICKMAN, FULTON CO., KY.

Fulton Lodge U. D., at Hickman, Fulton County, was chartered October 19, 1893, as Fulton Lodge No. 678. Joshua Nailor, Master; C. H. Bottzer, Senior Warden; W. E. Lumley, Junior Warden. The Lodge after an uneventful career surrendered its Charter August 7, 1900.

Chartered October 17, 1893. This Lodge has lost part of its minute books. It has a membership of forty-nine. In 1898

the Loage bought ground for a cemetery.

SALT LICK LODGE NO. 682 SALT LICK, BATH CO., KY.

Chartered October 17, 1893. Burned August 28, 1899. New Charter granted October 19, 1899.

HANSON LODGE NO. 683
HANSON, HOPKINS CO., KY.

Hanson Lodge No. 683, was granted a Charter October 17, 1894, and continued until July 10, 1899, and handed up its commission.

ST. HELENS LODGE NO. 684 ST. HELENS, LEE CO., KY.

St. Helens Lodge No. 684, was organized at St. Helens, Lee County, Kentucky, October 7, 1893. Held their first session under Dispensation of date September 19, 1893.

J. M. Beatty, Worshipful Master, of Proctor Lodge No. 213, proxy for Grand Master, installed the following appointed of ficers, viz: Charles D. Tyler, Master; James M. Thomas, Senior Warden; William Robinson, Junior Marden; G. D. Hierenmus, Treasurer; J. G. Thomas, Secretary; W. B. Lucas, Sebior Deacon; Letcher Snowden, Junior Deacon; Patton Coomer, Tyler.

The first year the membership increased from nine to nineteen.
The Charter was granted October 17, 1894.

Among the membership of the Lodge may be found nearly every Gospel Minister in the jurisdiction regardless of Creed or denomination. The moral, social and charitable influence, of the Lodge is recognized by the whole community, both the initiated and unitiated.

FILSON LODGE NO. 686 BOWEN, POWELL CO., KY.

Chartered October 17, 1894. Burned September 11, 1898. New Charter granted October 19, 1899.

CAMP KNOX LODGE NO. 687 CAMP KNOX, GREEN CO., KY.

Chartered October 17, 1894. Reports eight members.

EMULATION LODGE NO. 688 SHARPSVILLE, WASHINGTON CO., KY.

In the spring of 1894, Thomas G. Dennis, William S. Y. Goodlet, George W. Royalty, William D. Sharp, Winfield S. Colvin, George W. Shirley, Samuel E. Corn and John H. Young, petitioned the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky to grant them a

Dispensation to establish a Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons at Sharpsville, Washington County, Kentucky.

On the 25th., day of June, 1894, the Dispensation was issued but for some reason the Lodge was not set to work until the 15th., day of September, 1894. On that day John W. Reed, Past Master of T. N. Wise Lodge No. 349, Dugansville, Kentucky, acting as the proxy of the Grand Master, called the brethren together in an upper room of W. S. Y. Goodlet's residence and set the Lodge to work, by installing the following members as officers, viz: Thomas G. Dennis, Master; William S. Y. Goodlet, Senior Warden; George W. Royalty, Junior Warden; William D. Sharp, Treasurer; Winfield S. Colvin, Secretary; George W. Shirley, Senior Deacon; Samuel E. Corn, Junior Deacon; John H. Young, Tyler.

The meetings were held in W. S. Y. Goodlet's room for four or five months and then over J. W. Graham's store until the completion of the Lodge Hall in July, 1895.

Though the Craft had held but one meeting previous to the meeting of the Grand Lodge in October 1894, yet by paying dues and Home Assessment their representative was received on the same terms as those given representatives whose Lodges had sent in their reports on the 31st., of August.

The Dispensation granted was renewed in 1895 and 1896 and the Lodge continued under the administration of the same officers.

At the meeting of the Grand Lodge in 1897, a Charter was granted under the name and style of Emulation Lodge No. 688. On the 20th., day of November, 1897, at the thirty-ninth stated communication of the Lodge U. D., the Craft were called to order

by S. B. Noel, Past Master of J. Speed Smith Lodge No. 298, Willisburg, Kentucky, acting as the proxy of the Grand Master, and he as such proxy installed the officers and set the Lodge to work.

On the 27th of December, 1897, the following officers were elected and installed for the ensuing year, viz: W. S. Colvin, Master; C. E. Gibson, Senior Warden; S. E. Corn, Junior Warden; George W. Shirley, Treasurer; T. D. Graham, Secretary; C. C. Foster, Senior Deacon; D. C. Deeringer, Junior Deacon; J. E. Deeringer, Tyler.

There was increase in the membership in 1898.

The Craft own their own Hall, which was built in 1895 at a cost of three hundred dollars. It is built over a store room belonging to the Sharpsville Mill Company, and its dimensions are 22x28 feet. It is fairly well supplied with all the fixtures usually found in well regulated lodges.

The Lodge has at no time paid any large sums for charity; but small bequests are frequent and in the aggregate would amount to a very considerable sum.

The membership is made up of men of small purses but big hearts and fearless breasts. T. D. Graham has served the County as Assessor, and as a Representative in the General Assembly. Samuel D. Hale is now Deputy Sheriff, serving his second term. W. S. Colvin, J. A. Coulter and C. C. Foster have each filled the office of Justice of the Peace. W. G. Bowen, also served two or three terms as Deputy Sheriff. J. W. Graham, C. B. Graham, James H. Sea and T. G. Dennis, are or have been in the merchandise business and the latter is also in the undertaking

business. W. D. Sharp, W. S. Y. Goodlett, J. E. Deeringer, D. C. Deeringer and Isaac Armstrong have been engaged in milling. R. T. Adams is a physician, the other members are farmers.

None better knows than the Chairman of this Committee that they keep full cribs, well filled smoke houses, bulging larders and unaffected generous welcome for their friends.

BELL LODGE NO. 691
PINEVILLE, BELL CO., KY.

Josh Bell, now Bell County, Kentucky, was formed in 1867. Before that time, the territory was partly in Knox and partly in Harlan County, Kentucky. The whole territory was in the jurisdiction of Mountain Lodge No. 187, located at Barbourville, Knox County, Kentucky.

The facts about the establishment of the first Masonic Lodge in Josh Bell County are meagre. The first Lodge was chartered October 24, 1873, with James Gibson as Master, and it was known as the Pineville Lodge No. 534, located at Pineville, Kentucky,

the county seat. The Lodge grew in membership for a while, and numbered at the most about forty members. The territory was sparsely settled and of course the material to draw from was not plentiful. In about the year 1884, the interest in the Lodge began to wane, the members ceased to attend or pay dues, and it was finally decided that it was best that the Lodge should cease and go out of existence. Its Charter was therefore arrested by the Grand Lodge for non-payment of dues, by the Grand Master, James D. Black, October 23, 1889.

In the year 1888, the boom started in Bell County, and the population increased rapidly, but there was no effort to establish a Masonic Lodge at the county seat until 1894.

On October 17, 1894, Grand Master, James W. Staton, granted a dispensation, empowering Bell Lodge to act, and commissioned Daniel Boone Faulkner of Mountain Lodge No. 187, Barbourville, Kentucky, as his proxy, to open and set to work, under dispensation, a Lodge of Master Masons in Pireville, Kentucky. Pursuant to that authority, Mr. Faulkner, Past Master, and as proxy of the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky, called the members to order in Pireville, Kentucky, November 17, 1894, read his commission, opened the Lodge, presided as Master with J. E. Musson as Senior Warden, J. R. Rice, Junior Warden, J. C. Clark, Secretary pro tem, E. Hurst, Treasurer pro tem, C. J. Hargis, Senior Deacon, J. M. Unthank, Junior Deacon, W. D. Rollins, Tyler and Steward pro tem. There were present at this meeting besides the officers above mentioned, M. J. Moss and J. L. McCoy, Master Masons, and W. M. Bingham, Past Master. The Worhsipful Master

then proceeded to hold an election for Secretary and Tyler, with the following results: James H. Jeffries, Secretary; W. D. Rollins, Steward and Tyler. The Lodge fixed the second Monday and fourth Saturday of each month at seven o'clock P. M., for its regular meetings.

The next meeting was held November 24, 1894, fourth Saturday, and there were three petitions for initiation, and one for recommendation for demit from the Grand Lodge. The minutes of the meeting are signed by W. M. Bingham, W. M., and M. J. Moss, Sec'y pro tem.

This Lodge continued Under Dispensation about one year and held its last meeting on Septemeber 28, 1895, and during the year the membership increased until it numbered twenty-three. The Lodge, during the year, initiated, passed and raised, Dr. John S. Ward, W. W. Duffield, C. W. Metcalf, Robert Asher, Joe H. Davis, John E. Howard, L. K. Rice, and D. B. Logan. It initiated and passed J. B. Fields, and initiated Wm. Low. The dues to the Grand Lodge for the year 1895 were \$46.00. The membership on September 28, 1895, was as follows: W. M. Bingham, J. R. Rice, J. E. Musson, E. Hurst, James H. Jeffries, C. J. Hargis, J. L. McCoy, W. D. Rollins, J. M. Unthank, J. C. Clark, M. J. Moss, Andy B. Smith, D. B. Logan, Joe H. Davis, Robert Asher, C. W. Metcalf, John S. Ward, W. W. Duffield; Ballinger Calloway, John E. Howard, L. K. Rice, Master Masons; J. B. Fields, Fellow Craft, and Wm. Low, Entered Apprentice.

On the 16th., day of October, 1895, the Grand Lodge of Mentucky granted a Charter, creating and constituting a Lodge of

Trop a self

Free and Accepted Masons at Pineville, Mentucky, known as Bell Lodge No. 691, and named William M. Bingham to be first Master, John E. Musson, to be first Senior Warden, and John R. Rice, to be first Junior Warden. This Charter is signed by H. H. Holeman, Grand Master, F. C. Gerard, Deputy Grand Master, R. F. Peak, Grand Senior Warden, R. H. Thompson, Grand Junior Warden, and H. B. Grant, Grand Secretary, and bears the seal of the Grand Lodge.

On the same day, the Grand Master in writing appointed and commissioned as his proxy, Past Master and Past Grand Master,

James D. Black, of Barbourville, Kentucky, to assemble the brethren constituting the new Loage at Pineville, Aentucky, and there to open and set to work the Loage.

Pursuant to this Charter and authority, James D. Black called together the members, Master Masons of Bell Lodge, on Monday, November 4, 1895, at the Hall of the Lodge in Pineville, Ky., at seven o'clock P. M., and proceeded with the work, and appointed John E. Musson, Senior Warden pro tem, John R. Rice, Junior Warden pro tem, James H. Jeffries, Secretary pro tem, Elijah Hurst, Treasurer pro tem, John L. McCoy, Senior Deacon pro tem, Charles J. Hargis, Junior Deacon pro tem, and William D. Rollins, Tyler pro tem, and opened a Lodge of Master Masons. He then read the Charter and commission of proxy, and held an election for Secretary and Treasurer and Tyler, with the following results; for Secretary, James H. Jeffries; for Treasurer, Elijah Hurst; for Tyler, William D. Rollins. John L. McCoy was appointed Senior Deacon, and Charles J. Hargis, Junior, Deacon.

The aforesaid officers were then installed and the Lodge set to work, and designated as Bell Lodge No. 691. The first meeting of the Lodge was attended by seventeen of the members of Bell Lodge, and three visitors, besides Past Grand Master James D. Black.

From this beginning, the Lodge has continued until, at the present time, August 31, 1914, the membership numbers one hundred and twenty-one, and includes some of the best men of the community. Since November, 1895, the Lodge has raised to the sublime degree of Master Masons one hundred and fifteen, Fellow Crafts on an average of about six per year. The Lodge is in strong condition financially, but does not own its hall. It owns a lot in the cemetery in Pineville Kent for the interment of members of the Craft who die and need burial.

Chartered October 16, 1895, as High View Lodge No. 692.

October 20, 1898 named changed to Cromwell Lodge. Charter burned

June 11, 1904 and new one issued by Grand Lodge in October 1904.

PETERSBURG, BOONE CO., KY.

Petersburg Lodge No. 693, was chartered October 16, 1895, surrendering its Charter to the Grand Lodge September 3, 1903.

CRITTENDEN LODGE NO. 694
CRITTENDEN, GRANT CO., KY.

Chartered October 16, 1895. Reports twenty-seven members.

ATTILLA LODGE NO. 695 ATTILLA, LARUE CO., KY.

Granted dispensation May 15, 1895, and set towork by

James C. Jones, of Buffalo Lodge No. 570, as proxy of the Grand

Master. Charter granted October 20, 1897. James C. Jones

again officiating as proxy of the Grand Master. It reports

twenty-one members.

ELKIN LODGE NO. 696
ELKIN, CLARK CO., KY.

Chartered October 21, 1896. Charter burned October 1, 1908.

New Charter granted October 21, 1908. Reports forty-one members.

HIGH KNOB LODGE NO. 697 HIGH KNOB, JACKSON CO., KY.

Charter granted October 21, 1896. The present location is near the headwaters of Big Sextons Creek, about one and a half miles from its former location in Clay County. The Lodge was moved to Jackson County after after the building of a Lodge room there.

The house is frame, sealed and weather boarded, one story in height, with ante room, and Lodge Hall, about twenty by thirty

feet in dimension, situated on a high hill top about fourteen or fifteen hundred feet above sea level, with a fine view of the surrounding country. The Craft now own one-half the Hall, having sold half the building to the Knights of Pythias.

John William Mullins, the first Master, was County Judge of this county for one term, and W. A. Cope represented the County in the State Legislature.

RIO VERDE LODGE NO. 698
HARDYVILLE, HART CO., KY.

Chartered October 21, 1896. Meets at Gilead Hall. Reports sixty-seven members.

RICHARDSON LODGE NO. 699
RICHARDSON, LAWRENCE CO., KY.

Chartered October 20, 1897. Reports twenty-five mem bers.

MARSHALL LODGE NO. 700
PORT ROYAL, HENRY CO., KY.

The first meeting of the parent Lodge was held on September 9, 1865, and was known as Port Royal Lodge U. D., granted by J. D. Landrum, Grand Master, with the following officers:

T. J. Bourne, Master; William Duderson, Senior Warden; M. S. Montgomery, Junior Warden, and worked as such until November 12, 1866, when a Charter was granted, and it became known as Marshall Lodge No. 427, and continued as such until December 9,

1866, when it surrendered its Charter.

The Lodge is named in honor Mrs. Judith L. Marshall.

On March 14, 1896, a number of the old members applied for a new Charter, as Port Royal Lodge U. D., with the following officers: RobertGruss, Master; Sam Dunaway, Senior Warden; S. K. Jones, Junior Warden.

October 21, 1896, a Charter was granted as Marshall Lodge No. 700, and has continued as such up to the present time.

BENTON LODGE NO. 701
BENTON, MARSHALL CO., KY.

Benton Lodge No. 701, formerly existed as No. 205, dispensation for which was granted some time prior to August 1849. This dispensation was renewed in August 1849, and a Charter was granted by the Grand Lodge in August, 1850, with R. E. Rowland as Master. The Lodge had a membership of thirty-seven in 1858. No record of this Lodge later than 1874 can be found. At that time it had a membership of seventy-four and it became defunct in 1879. On June 25, 1896, the present Lodge was set to work U. D., by J. E. Wilhelm, of Paducah, proxy of the Grand Master, with Warner Moore, Jr., Master, B. F. Hall, Senior Warden, R. L. Shemwell, Junior Warden, and T. H. Hall, Secretary, and with a membership of twenty-three. A Charter was granted October 21, 1896, and the Lodge was designated therein as Benton Lodge No. 701 under which title it has since said date regularly worked. On December 8, 1911, the hall owned by the Lodge together with all the lodge

paraphernalia and Charter was destroyed by fire. The records were saved. A dispensation was immediately granted by Grand Master, Dave Jackson, and the lodge thus worked until Grand Lodge Communication in 1912, when a Charter was granted in lieu of the one burned. The Lodge now has sixty-four members, six of whom are Charter members.

SCOTT LODGE NO. 702 STAMFING GROUND, SCOTT CO., KY.

Charte red October 21, 1896. Reports sixty-eight members.

BUSH LODGE NO. 703 LIDA, LUAREL CO., KY.

Bush Lodge was organized under dispensation June 13, 1896, by P. L. Young, of Pleasant Hill Lodge No. 535, as proxy for Grand Master, with C. Day as Master, J. C. Jones, Senior Warden, and G. S. Brock, Junior Warden, S. S. Phillips, Secretary, M. Cregy, Treasurer, S. W. Dodge, Senior Deacon; J. J. Jones, Junior Deacon, L. H. Vaughn, Steward and Tyler. And on November 14, 1896, it was set to work under Charter by D. B. Faulkner, of Mountain Lodge No. 167, with same of ficers, and on said date (November 14) five were made Masons.

These first meetings were in a rented house, but now the Lodge owns its hall.

WILLIAM B. ELLEN LODGE NO. 704 SUMMERSVILLE, GREEN CO., KY.

Chartered October 20, 1897, at Pleasant Valley, Green County, moved to Summersville in 1898. June 5, 1900, lost Charter by fire. October 18, 1900, new Charter granted. Reports thirty members.

NEATSVILLE LODGE NO. 705 NEATSVILLE, ADAIR CO., KY.

Chartered October 19, 1898. Reports twenty-two members.

ASHLEY LODGE NO. 706
BLACKFOOT, WEBSTER CO., KY.

'Chartered October 19, 1898. Reports sixty-seven members.

GRAHAMVILLE LODGE NO. 707
GRAHAMVILLE, McCRACKEN CO., KY.

Chartered October 20, 1897. Reports eleven members.

SOLDIER LODGE NO. 708 SOLDIER, CARTER CO., KY.

Chartered October 20, 1897. Reports fifty-four members.

BURGIN LODGE NO. 709
BURGIN, MERCER CO., KY.

October 20, 1897, a Charter was granted to Burgin Lodge U. D., and numbered 709. The Lodge held its meetings twice each month, began with a membership of ten Master Masons, continued an uneventful career until December 13, 1903, when it went out of existence.

THACKER LODGE NO. 710 CRYSTAL, LEE CO., KY.

Chartered October 20, 1897, and set to work by B. H. Sale, of Bibb Lodge No. 368. The first Master was W. S. Thacker.

This Lodge became defunct October 18, 1900. The Charter was restored October 22, 1902. The Lodge again went under October 21, 1903 - the Charter was restored October 20, 1904.

TORRENT LODGE NO. 711
TORRENT, WOLFE CO., KY.

Chartered October 19, 1898. Reports thirty-five members.

LITTLE SANDY LODGE NO. 712 ROSEDALE, CARTER CO., KY.

During the month of March, 1896, nine Masons, viz: J. B. Craig, D. P. Craig, B. M. Craig, W. C. Horton, Luke Carroll, Lewis Maddix, J. W. Knipp, J. V. Bledsoe and J. E. Walker, being

remotely situated from their respective lodges, held a meeting, and discussed their Masonic location, and desire for a Lodge nearer where they might meet and have the pleasure of full Masonic enjoyment.

They passed a resolution asking the Grand Lodge to grant them a Lodge, and setting another date for a meeting of the persons living in the community.

On the date of the second meeting there gathered a large crowd of people, and the proposition of a new church house and a Masonic hall over it, was presented, the motion was favorably received and a committee was appointed to solicit subscriptions to the proposed building. The result was a subscription of \$860.00 paid in full. The nine Masons contributing \$400.00 of the amount. The preparation of building was at once begun, and during the summer of 1897, the building was completed, the Masons having secured full control of the second story. The petition to the Grand Lodge was prepared and presented, and was favorably received and, Little Sandy Lodge U. D., was instituted October 20, 1897 by a dispensation, and set to work by Past Master George W. Blizzard, of Trimble Lodge No. 145, November 6, 1897. The brethren composing the Lodge were Master, James B. Craig; Senior Warden, David P. Craig; Junior Warden, John V. Bledsoe; Secretary, Bernard M. Craig; Treasurer, William C. Horton; Senior Deacon, Jeremiah Walker; Junior Deacon, John W. Knipp; Tyler, Luke Carroll, and Lewis Maddix.

During the year 1908, there came into the community the "Holiness" people. The teaching of this cult caused a standstill

in Masonic circles for a short time, and induced three of the brethren to resign from the Fraternity. This act influenced several others in such a way that they failed to pay dues and were therefore suspended for non-payment. The Lodge attendance ran very low and at times it was so low that a Lodge of Entered Apprentice Masons could not be opened for work. Notwithstanding those who were zealous continued to meet and to hold lodges, for a period of about four years, when the influence of the "Holiness" people waned and the brethren again began to visit Lodge. The Lodge began to grow, petitions came in and the Lodge took on new vigor. At the present time it is in fine condition. The Lodhe has on its roster at present thirty-three Master Masons, two Fellowcrafts, and one Entered Apprentice.

There are five Past Masters. Little Sandy Lodge owns her own Hall, located in the country nine miles South of Grayson Kentucky, in Carter County, and named from the river near it. The regular communications are held on the third Saturday of each month at 1:30 P. M.

KENTUCKY ARMY LODGE NO. 1 U. D.

In the spring of 1898, the First Regiment Kentucky State Guards was camped at Lexington, Kentucky, waiting to be mustered into the Federal Service. A number of the officers and men being Masons, Capt. John H. Cowles suggested that an effort be made to establish an Army Lodge, a precedent having been established during the Revolutionary and Civil Wars. The following petition was sent to M. W. Grand Master R. H. Thompson.

"Camp Bradley, near Lexington, Ky., May 24, 1898-- To the Most Worshipful, the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky:

This petition showeth that we are Master Masons, members of Kentucky lodges and soldiers in the United States volunteer service, so on to commence active operations against our country's foes, and relieve those who have been subjected to the cruelties of a bloody and pitiless people.

By this response to our country's call we are cut off from the pleasures of social meetings with our brethren and from the restrining influence of active Masonic work, and from paying the last sad honors of Masonry to such of our comrades as shall fall in the sterm realities of a soldier's life.

We do not desire to form a lodge such as is contemplated by our Grand Lodge constitution, to be permanently located with territorial jurisdiction, for that, in the nature of the case, would be impossible. But we do most earnestly desire, and pray for, a dispensation empowering us to meet in a lodge capacity within our camp or post, there to perform all the duties of a lodge, in receiving members, initiating, passing and raising those whom having the essential qualifications, may be deemed worthy, confining our jurisdiction to soldiers who are in fact residents of tentucky. These conrades could not join any other lodge, unless they should, for an hour or more, happen to be in neighborhood of the lodge near their homes, am this is so improbable as to be accounted among the impossibilities, so we would in no way interfere with the jurisdiction of any lodge or Grand Lodge.

"Thus would be established a temporary lodge such as was established with the Kentucky troops during the Mexican War, of which our beloved Past Grand Master Thomas Todd was an officer. It would not, therefore, disturb our present relations with our home lodges, which we cannot find it in our hearts to sever, for when the war is over we will return (God willing) to our present affiliations, the work of our temporary traveling lodge being ended after having, as we trust, accomplished very much good among our comrades, comforting them in their sufferings, and. it may be, depositing the ir remains with the honors of our ancient and beloved frate mity. We cannot think that those who have given up the delights of home and its surroundings for the honor of their country, ought to be deprived of the precious knowledge of the comforting reflection that their bodies(if they fall) may be deposited in mother earth by the loving hands of the craft, and with all the honors of Maso mry.

We recommend that Brothers John H. Cowles, Wallace W. Morris, and F. W. Hardwick, be appointed Master and Wardens of this temporary lodge, to be known as "Kentucky Army Lodge No. 1 Under Dispensation".

This petition was carefully prepared under advice from the Grand Secretary, Brother H. B. Grant, whose familiarity with precedents made his assistance invaluable. On Sunday, June 5, the Grand Master, with Grand Secretary Grant and Brother Frank

" H. Johnson, came to Lexington and after consultation with them and with Masons here, concluded to grant the dispensation. Two chief obstacles were in the way. First, the constitutional requirement that the demits of petitioners must accompany the petition; and second, the fear of invading the territory of other Grand Lodges as the troops moved from place to place. It was decided that these objections could be met. As to the first, there is no constitutional procision for the establishment of traveling lodges, (whose existence is temporary), and the Grand Master is free to exercise his prerogative in such cases. A fur ther provision was to be inserted in the dispensation requiring members of this Lodge to receive denits from the Grand Secretary on their return from war. The second objection was met by limiting membership to citizens of Kentucky temporarily absent on military service. After the matter had been well considered the Grand Master and Grand Secretary returned to Louisville. But, in pursuance of their plans, on Monday night, June 6, 1898, Devotion Lodge No. 160 - one of the two lodges of Masons in Lexington met in called session and placed the following endorsement on the petition, viz:

Hall of Devotion Lodge No. 160, F. & A. M., Lexington, Ky., June 6, 1898. This is to certify that the within petition was presented to the above named lodge at a meeting holden the day and date above written, and the above named lodge consented to the issuing of the dispensation prayed for in this petition. In testimony whereof witness my hand as Worshipful Master of said lodge, attested by the secretary and seal of the lodge.

Immediately after this action the lodge closed and the members went to the hall at Lexington Lodge No. 1, which was in session. The officers of the proposed lodge were present, and were requested to confer the Master's degree on a candidate(Mr. Headley Land) who was in waiting. This they did in a highly creditable manner, and the lodge thereupon caused the following endorsement to be made upon the petition(it was a regular meeting of the Lodge), viz:

Hall of Lexington Lodge No. 1, Lexington, Ky., June 6, 1898This is to certify that the within petition was presented to the above named lodge at a meeting holden the day etc., above written, and on motion was most heartily recommended. The lodge also declared its opinion that the proposed new (temporary) lodge was both desirable and necessary. The brethren recommended in said petition as Master and Wardens were examined in open lodge and found to be proficient in the work and lectures of the symbolic degrees of Masonry, and fully competent to do all the work as officers according to the ancient landmarks and in a most creditable manner.

In testimony whe reof witness my hand as Secretary, and the seal of the said Lexington Lodge #1.

These proceedings were rendered necessary by the provisions of Section 4, Article 10, of the constitution, and the requirements were strictly complied with.

"The regiment being at present stationed here, the consent of all lodges who jurisdiction might be affected was necessary. There being only two lodges here, both gave consent, and the "nearest lodge" recommended the application, declared its necessity and certified to the ability of its officers.

The Grand Master was informed by telegraph the same night that all requirements had been complied with. The next morning (Tuesday) the petition and endorsements were read to the Grand Secretary over long distance telephone, and the following dispensation was prepared, viz:

IN THE NAME AND BY THE AUTHORITY OF THE GRAND LODGE OF KENTUCKY.

Free and Accepted Masons.

To Whom these presents may come, greeting:

Whereas, Brothers John H. Cowles, Wallace W. Morris, Fred W. Hardwick, G. T. Sprau, Doc C. Stratton, John B. Castleman, J. T. Nelson, D. L. Sauer, W. S. Rigsby, R. A. Hoeppner, Chas. F. Starck, W. A. Vanice, B. A. Farrell, and George C. Hall, being Free and Accepted Masons and citizens of Aentucky, in the volunteer service of the United States, engaged in war with Spain, pray that, they may be authorized to work, as a temporary lodge under dispensation, during the said war, without disturbing their affiliation with the Mentucky lodges to which they belong, in order that they may meet as Masons and thus encourage the practice of our sublime principles while subjected to the trials and temptations of army life in time of war, and lay to rest,

"with the honors of the craft, any of their brethren who may fall while engaged in the service of their country, and it appearing to be for the benefit of our ancient and honorable frate mity.

Be it known. That by the power vested in me. I have hereby authorized our brethren aforesaid to open and hold a temporary Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons at the posts and camps of their companies or regiment, or at some convenient place near the same, to be known as the Kentucky Army Lodge Number One, Under Dispensation: vesting them with power therein to receive regular affiliated Kentucky Masons who, at the time are in the service of the United States as aforesaid, to companionship in said lodge: to admit to said companionship, on demit, etc., Master Masons, citizens of Kentucky, who are also in said service: to enter apprentices, pass fellow crafts, and raise Master Masons, regularly, from among such citizens as aforesaid, as any lodge under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Mentucky, F. & A. M. could do. except that the jurisdiction of the said temporary lodge hereby authorized is not territorial. but is confined and limited to citizens of Kentucky in the volunteer military or naval service of the United States, as before mentioned.

I hereby appoint Brothers John H. Cowles to be Master, Wallace W. Morris to be Senior Warden and Fred W. Hardwick to be Junior Warden of said temporary lodge. All actual Past Masters who may be admitted to companionship therein will retain their rank, etc., as if really Past Masters thereof, so that in case of the absence of the Master and Wardens, they may act as by how provided. I

"require all of said brethren and their associates to be governed by the "model Code" of by-laws, approved by the Grand Lodge of Kentucky; also by all the laws thereof; to keep a record of their proceedings and promptly send a copy of same, after each meeting, to the Grand Secretary, and make due return, as all other Lodges should do. In case of dissolution, from any cause, to promptly transmit all books, papers, money or other property of said lodge, and this dispensation, to said Grand Secretary.

This dispensation shall continue in force until the 19th., day of October, 1898, and no longer, unless renewed, of which certificate of the fact must be endorsed he reon.

Lastly: The Master Wardens, Past Masters and others in companionship, with said Lodge, by accepting this dispensation, solemnly engage to conform to all the foregoing requirements expressed or implied, and at all times to hold themselves subordinate to and under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky aforesaid.

In testimony whereof witness my hand as Grand Master of said Grand Lodge of Kentucky, Free and Accepted Masons, with the seal of said Grand Lodge, and the attestation of the Grand Secretary thereof, this 7th day of June, 1898, at Louisville, Kentucky. (Seal) R. H. Thompson,

"that the officers and all connected with it agree that at the dissolution of said lodge, or at the termination of the service in the army of volunteers each one agrees to apply for affiliation in some lodge of Free Masons near his residence, and that all withdrawals(demits) from the "Kentucky Army Lodge #1 U. D." shall be obtained from the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky.

met in called session. Devotion Lodge soon called "to refreshment" and entered the hall where Lexington Lodge was in session. The Grand Master was announced and received with appropriate honors. Then a formal tender was made him of the hall, for the purpose of constituting the new lodge. After its acceptance Lexington Lodge was called "to refreshment" and a special session of Grand Lodge opened, the Grand Master, Reginald H. Thompson, presiding; F. H. Johnson, Deputy Grand Master, H. K. McAdams, G. S. W.; John F. Cruickshank, G. J. W.; W. H. Waltz, G. S. D.; S. R. Van Dyke, G. J. D.; Butler Southgate, G. Sec., and P. G. M. J. Soule Smith, as Grand Marshall. There were now three lodges in operation in this single room - two refreshment and one (the Grand Lodge) at labor.

The new lodge had as yet, neither clothing, furniture, nor jewels, so those of Lexington Lodge #1 were used.

The ceremonies were very impressive, and the Grand Master was deeply moved, especially as he delivered the charge to the new Master. After the installation of its officers, Kentucky

"Army Lodge was declared to be duly constituted and empowered to work, the Lodge then proceeded to elect the other officers, Bro. Don C. Stratton was elected Secretary, Bro. Geo. C. Hall, Treasurer, Bro. Rudolph A. Hoeppner was appointed Senior Deacon, Bro. Benjamin A. Farrell, Junior Deacon, and allwere installed by the Grand Master.

P. G. M. J. Soule Smith of Lexington Lodge #1 in a very happy speech on behalf of Bro. Frank H. Johnson, P. M., of Louisville Lodge #400, presented the Lodge with the great lights. The present was accepted and a rising vote of thanks was extended to Bro. Johnson. The by-laws, rules and regulations prepared by Grand Secretary Henry B. Grant known as the "Model Code" was adopted for the government of the lodge. A vote of thanks was tendered to Lexington Lodge #1 and Devotion Lodge #160 F. & A. M., for their assistance, and the use of their Lodge room, furniture &c, during the institution. The first and third Mondays in each month were fixed for the stated communications. The Lodge was then closed in due and Ancient form. There had been four Lodges open at once in this room. The Grand Lodge was then closed, Devotion Lodge repaired to its room, called to labor and closed, and Lexington Lodge called to labor, finished its business and closed, with the invitation to attend a banquet at Lands.

Shortly after this the regiment was ordered to Chicamauga
Park, Ga., where it became part of the First Army Corps. The
first meeting of the lodge was held in the tent of Capt. Cowles
on June 20th, sentinels being stationed about the tent to keep off
cowans and eavesdroppers. Quite a number of visitors were

"present. M. W. G. M. R. H. Thompson, Grand Secretary H. B. Grant, P. G. M. J. Soule Smith, and P. M. Frank H. Johnson were elected Honorary Members.

Bro. Sanders of Devotion Lodge #160 presented a set of Gavels to the officers, and Bro. James P. Gregory of Excelsion Lodge #258 presented the Lodge with \$20.00 to aid in purchasing lodge furniture. Bros. Hardwick, Farrell and Hoeppner were appointed a committee to secure paraphernalia, and a place for meeting. Talks were made by Beo. Hal T. Jefferson, P. M. of Excelsior Lodge #258 and Bro. John M. Tipton, of Central Lodge #71, Springfield, Ill., Seargeant of the First Ill. Cavalry. Fee for the three degrees was fixed at \$20.00. Several petitions were received. A regular meeting was held at Camp Geo. H. Thomas on July 18th., Several petitions were received and the regular routine business was conducted. The regiment was then moved to Newport News, Va., and a regular meeting held there on August 1st, and petitions were received from a large number of members of the 3rd Regiment, but as they went to Cuba, and we were ordered to Porto Rico, they were never acted upon. The next meeting was held on August 13, in the Quartel de Infanteria Mayaguez, Porto Rico in the audience chamber of the Commander, the Worshipful Master being seated on a dais over which was suspended a portrait of Alphonso XIII, King of Spain. The Fellowcraft Degree was comferred upon Bro. I. L. Schulhafer, Lieutenant Company "M", at the request of St. George Loage #239. Another meeting was held August 25th in the same quarters, and the Intered Apprentice Degree conferred on Bro. Chas. T. Smith, Seargeant Company "M". The regiment was then

"moved across the Island to Camp James H. Wilson, near Ponce, and a meeting was held in the tent of Capt. John H. Cowles, on September 5th, where the regular routine business was transacted. This being the rainy season, it was almost impossible to confer degrees in a tent, and having information that a lodge had be en at work in Ponce some time before our occupation, it was deemed advisable to try and locate it, and get permission to confer the degrees in their room, as we had at that time a number of candidates. Lieutenant Hardwick being on detached duty volunteered to do this. The first man approached was the Alcalde (an American appointee) but his memory failed him entirely, he had never heard of a Masonic Lodge, other prominent citizens were interviewed, with the same results. After two days doligent search no clue was found. Finally Mr. Steinacher, the Superintendent of the Gas Works, who talked English fluently, was interviewed. but he volunteered no information until Lieutenant Hardwick produced his 33rd degree patent, which had the megic effect of getting him to talk, and giving the desired information, the next morning he secured us an audience with the Master and Secretary of the Lodge, who took us to the lodge room and tendered to us the use of same. It was situated on the street we used in going to and from our camp, we had passed it many times. We found that the reason for keeping the lodgerroom such a secret was, that the Captain General of the Island, three previous to our occupation had ordered all communication between Masons to Bro. Steinacher had be en ordered to San Juan, the capital, at his expense to be told by the Captain General that

"the secret service had information that meetings of Masons were being held in Bro. Steinacher's residence, and that he would be placed in excommunicado if any more were held. After the Masons in Ponce found that we were friendly, and did not desire to persecute them, they became very enthusiastic and began holding meetings and conferring the degrees.

The next meeting of the Lodge was held September 20th, at 10 A. M., in the hall of Modestio Lodge. We admitted as visitors the following members of Modestio Lodge, Jules E. Steinacher, Dematro Grayens, Jose Pacheco Gariva.

The Entered Apprentice degree was conferred upon Major David W. Gray, Lieut. James R. Triplett and Jesse G. Yates. On October 19. 1898. a meeting was held in the quarters of Company "H", First Kentucky Infantry. The regular routine business of the Lodge was conducted and candidates examined. On October 22nd, a meeting was held in the hall of Modestio Lodge at which a large number of the members of Modestio Lodge were present. The fellowcraft degree was conferred upon Lieut. Triplett. The Worshipful Master on behalf of the Lodge, thanked Modestio Lodge for the use of the Lodge room and for many courtesies extended to them, Worshipful Master Corazon replied, as did several other of his members, whose speeches were interpreted by Bro. Augustro Taylor. The affair was a general love feast, but their habit of embracing with breast to breast and hand to back, was rather embarrassing, especially so to Lieut. Hardwick who was embraced by a large Mamacian regro, much to the amusement of the other members of

"our Lodge, but it was not very long afterwards that the laugh was on Worshipful Master Cowles, he being visited by Senor Tomasco Ramos and his two daughters, who were rather dusky, they presented their faces to be kissed, and the Worshipful Master could not deny them.

On November 7, a regular me et ing was held at the quarters of the 1st Batallion. A communication was received from Grand Secretary Grant notifying us that the Grand Lodge of entucky had continued the dispensation for another year. The Worshipful Master reported that he had presented on behalf of the Lodge, An American Flag to Modestio Lodge, which was received in a most unique manner. After Worshipful Master Cowles had made the presentation, the Master called up the lodge, the members forming two parallel lines on either side of the altar facing inward. Worshipful Master Corazon left his station in the East, going to the ante room, returning with the flag across his left shoulder, proceeded through the lines on the steps (the members presenting swords) to his station. He draped the flag across his chair and column, stepping back a few paces he saluted it with the dueguard and sign, and faced the lodge. The lines were then faced to the East, and beginning on the right, the members saluted the flag in a like manner and resumed their stations. Not knowing that they were to be presented with this flag, and having but recently been forced to accept the new emblem, we were pleased with the ceremony. The Stars and Stripes were making friends.

A called meeting was held November 27th in the hall of

"Modestio Lodge, and the Fellowcraft degree conferred on Major David W. Gray. Shortly after this, the regiment was ordered back to the States, and the next meeting was held in the office of Worshipful Master Cowles, 215 S. Sixth Street, and the following resolution adopted:

lst - That this Lodge having witnessed in Porto Rico the conferring of the symbolic degrees by the principle officers and brethren of the petitioners herein, it is of the opinion that the work was exceptionally well done, and that the brethren are capable of doing the work according to the Ancient land marks.

- 2 That the establishment of the Lodge prayed for in Porto Rico is hereby recommended.
- 3- That the said Lodge is necessary.

These resolutions with a petition for a Charter from about two hundred Masons residing in Porto Rico, was presented to Grand Secretary Grant. On February 20, 1899, a regular meeting of the Lodge was held, and a motion prevailed that Louisville Lodge #400 F. & A. M., be requested to confer the respective degrees on the candidates which the Lodge had elected. The records were turned over to Grand Secretary Grant the following day, and the members of Mentucky Army Lodge #1 U. D., ceased its labors and the brethren were admitted to membership in different Lodges of their choosing!

WEST BEND LODGE NO. 713 WEST BEND, POWELL CO., KY.

The records show that at a called mesting held in the Lodge hall on the 19th of February, 1898, the Lodge, U. D., was called to order by Ed. N. Wildson, of Fowell Lodge No. 645, as proxy of Grand Master, R. H. Thompson. The Lodge was opened on the Masters degree, and the following officers installed: D. D. Potts, Master; B. F. Berry, Senior Warden; T. B. Ware, Junior Warden; Jas. Hensley, Secretary; J. W. Baker, Treasurer, I. N. Berry, Tyler. The Master appointed J. A. Roberts, Senior Deacon, and the Senior Warden appointed R. L. Ware, Junior Deacon, and they were duly installed. Of the above four are still members of this Lodge. James Henley passed to his reward after a useful and honorable life, having filled various stations in the Lodge. He served as Master in the years 1902 and 1904.

Another Charter member deserves especial mention on account of faithful work - B. F. Berry, who has served the Lodge in nearly every position, both elective and appointive. He has been elected to the Master's chair three different times since 1898, first in 1899, again in 1900, and 1905.

Rev. D. P. Ware, who was greatly beloved by the Craft, and who presented the Holy Bible that is still in use on the Lodge altar, passed from this life December 15, 1904. He was so well loved that the Lodge has a life size portrait of him hung in the Hall.

CENTERTOWN LODGE NO. 714
CENTERTOWN, OHIO CO., KY.

Chartered October 19, 1899. Reports sixty-seven members.

RUSH LODGE NO. 715

GEIGERSVILLE, BOYD CO., KY. (P. O. RUSH.)

Lodge chartered October 19, 1899. This Lodge is situated in a mining district near the Carter County line. The membership is composed largely of miners, who are a migratory set of fellows - not residing long at the same place. The Lodge minutes, for the first three years of its existence, have been lost. The membership is small and the collection os dues is reported by the Master of the Lodge as a difficult undertaking.

SHAWHAN, BOURBON CO., KY.

In December 1898, A. Percy Adair, William A. Barnes, Luther C. Ashcraft, Joe H. Ewalt, W. Frank Howard, Porter Jett, Thomas A. Montgomery, John A. LaRue, James T. Snodgrass and James H. Talbott filed their demits with and petitioned Grand Master ames E. Wilhelm for a lodge to be located at Shawhan, Bourbon County; Kemtucky.

On January 12, 1899, the Grand Master granted the request and is sued a dispensation for a lodge to be known as Shawhan Lodge."

Under Dispensation. The lodge was set to work on January 28,

1899, by the Grand Junior Warden, Harry Bailey, and the following were installed as officers: Joe H. Ewalt, Master; A. Percy Adair, Senior Warden; W. Frank Howard, Junior Warden; John A. LaRue, Secretary; Thomas A. Montgomery, Treasurer; James T. Snodgrass, Senior Deacon; Luther C. Ashcraft, Junior Deacon; James H. Talbott, Senior Steward, Porter Jett, Junior Steward, William A. Barnes, Tyler.

The Lodge continued to work under dispensation until the annual communication of the Grand Lodge held in October, 1899, when a Charter was granted under the name of Shawhan Lodge No. 716, and was set to work under Charter by the Grand Senior Warden, Harry Bailey, on November 11, 1899. The brethren who served as officers when the Lodge worked under dispensation were installed into the same offices.

The growth of the Lodge has been spasmodic, but has increased in membership until there are now enrolled forty-two(42) Master Lasons and one(1) Entered Apprentice. While death has been a factor, still the greatest loss in membership has been caused by withdrawals occasioned by the brethren removing to other jurisdictions. Messrs. Adair, Barnes, Ewalt and Jett are the only Charter members now on the roll. Messrs. Howard, LaRue, Snodgrass and Talbott have joined the Celestial Lodge. Mr. Ashcraft is a member of Paris Lodge No. 2, Paris, Kentucky and Mr. Montgomery is a resident of California.

The ballot box has been well guarded, consequently the personnel is first class and will compare most favorably with any in this Grand Jurisdiction. The membership is composed

of the best element of the community, principally farmers and sturdy business men, who have the interest of the order at heart. In the fifteen years existence the records show that only three stand suspended for non-payment of dues.

The Constitution and Regulations are strictly complied with and the degree work attractively done.

Considerable pride has been taken in social functions, and almost invariably brethren from neighboring lodges are guests on these festal occasions. Several Grand Officers have made official visits.

The Lodge is proud of the distinction of having on its roster one of the eight brethren who have filled the highest office in each of the four Grand Bodies of York Rite Masomy in Mentucky, the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons, the Grand Chapter of Roal Arch Masons, the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters, and the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar, viz: Joe H. Ewalt, who is now Junior Past Grand Master.

Financially the Lodge has forged ahead, being the owner of a modern and substantial building of two stories located on a good sized lot a few hundred feet from the Louisville and Nash-ville Railroad passenger depot. By concerted action on the part of the progressives it was made possible to finance this judicious investment.

But few have sought political honors or been prominent in civil life, preferring to look after their own affairs. W. Jeff Kiser and Porter Jett have each served one term as Magistrate of Bourbon County, and Joseph A. Farris, is now serving his second

term as Jailer o

term as jailer of the same County.

FOREST GROVE LODGE NO. 717
DOT, LOGAN CO., KY.

Forest Grove Lodge No. 717 located at Dot, on Red River, in Logan County, Kentucky, was organized and set to work under dispensation from the Grand Lodge of the State of Kentucky, by John G. Orndorff, Past Grand Master, April 17, 1899. The following Charter members being present: W. J. Hawkins, Adam Hollman Cole, George Forest Dorris, Newton Walton Dorris, Mose Cook, Jasper Claybam Burchett, James Wærren Stratton, William Johnson Hawkins, William Asbury Bibb, Archibald W. McReynolds, John Thomas Young. The following officers were installed: A. H. Cole, Master; George F. Dorris, Senior Marden; M. Cook, Junior Warden; John T. Young Secretary; J. C. Burchett, Treasurer; N. W. Dorris, Senior Deacon; W. J. Hawkins, Junior Deacon. The Lodge was granted its Charter in October, 1899.

The Lodge after being set to work, not having its own Lodge room in which to meet, did as in ancient times, held its meetings in low and on high places, whereever a comfortable building could be found, sometimes in tobacco barns. After about twelve months the Lodge erected its own hall.

Three times since the establishment of the Lodge death has invaded the circle of the Craft.

CALLOWAY LODGE NO. 718 BURCHFIELD, BELL CO., KY.

May 8, 1899, a dispensation was granted for the organization of a lodge at the Calloway School House, Bell County, Kentucky: the dispensation named Solomon A. Saylor as Master, Wilson B. Saylor, as Senior Warden and James Shackelford, as Junior Warden.

On May 20, 1899, James A. Hopkins, as proxy of the Grand Master, set the Lodge to work. Under this dispensation the Lodge meetings were held twice a month until November 4, 1899, when the Lodge was assembled by James A. Hopkins, proxy of the Grand Master, to receive the Charter, granted October 19,1899. The former officers were all re-elected and installed.

This Lodge since its organization has sent thirteen orphan children to the Masonic Widows and Orphans Home: the report to the Grand Lodge in 1913 shows its membership to number forty-six, of whom thirteen bear the surname Saylor and thirteen the surname Howard.

WALTON LODGE NO. 719
WALTON, BOONE CO., KY.

A number of Master Masons, members of Lodges in the City of Louisville and residents of the Southern Section of the City, desirous of attending a Masonic Lodge, there being none closer than the Masonic Temple, a distance of three miles, conceived the idea of forming a Lodge in their immediate vicinity. A petition containing the names of twenty-five Master Masons, together with the consent of the Lodges in the City of Louisville, were secured. A dispensation was granted by the Grand Master, Harry Bailey, to form a Lodge under the name of Suburban Lodge U.D.

On the evening of April 4, 1902, the following Master Masons met in Iriquois Hall, Third and "O" Streets: A. D. Scott, E. J. Ashcraft, Harry Barker, T. W. Longacre, David Franklin, Mahlen S. Campbell, Jeff. D. Gregory, J. W. Moore, Charles Moir, Archie L. Daniels, J. William Miller, George H. Shaw, T. W. Cartright, William Farrar, John L. Burkhart, William Samuels, Richard Patton, William Harris Dupin, James G. Eskridge, John S. Venable,

R. C. Morrison, Luther G. Scanlon, William S. McDonald, Lestie L. Hill and John Kellar.

Isaac A. Kelly, Past Master of Freston Lodge No. 281, holding a commission as proxy for the Grand Master, Harry Bailey, assembled the brethren and appointed George H. Shaw as Secretary. After reading his commission of proxy and the dispensation of the Grand Master, Mr. Kelley proceeded with the appointment of the following brethren for the purpose of opening a Lodge of Master Masons: Walter M. Crutchfield of Compass Lodge No. 223, as Senior Warden; Charles Gipe, of Robinson Lodge No. 266, as Junior Warden; Clarence Warren, of Fall City No. 376, as Senior Deacon; George R. Middleton of Kilwinning No. 506 as Junior Deacon; John Lemmel, of Excelsior No. 258, as Treasurer, and James G. Eskridge, of the petitioners, as Tyler. The Lodge being opened in due form. He then proceeded with the election of a Treasurer, Secretary and Tyler. J. William Miller celcted Treasurer, George H. Shaw Secretary and James G. Eskridge Tyler.

Mr. Kelley then installed the following officers, Past Master John Maas acting as Marshal: A. D. Scott, Master; E. J. Ashcraft, Senior Warden; T. W. Longacre, Junior Warden; J. William Miller, Treasurer; George H. Shaw, Secretary; Jeff D. Gregory, Senior Deacon; William H. Dupin, Junior Deacon; James G. Eskridge, Tyler; J. W. Moore, Steward, and A. L. Daniels, Steward.

The Lodge was then proclaimed legally instituted and its officers authorized to enter upon the discharge of their duties.

Past Grand Master James W. Hopper acting for T. L. Jefferson on behalf of the Board of Directors of the Masonic Widows and Orphans

Home presented the Lodge with a set of solid silver Officers' Jewels. These Jewels had been presented to the Home by two of its zealous friends, Messrs. Cook and Sloss. They had been the property of several Lodges but were invariably re-presented to the Home.

S. R. Calveard, on behalf of Mrs. George H. Shaw, wife of Secretary, presented the Lodge with a handsome Altar cover and Bible.

Twenty-seven petitions for initiation were presented. After the close of business, remarks were made of an encouraging and instructive nature, and Suburban Lodge U.D., was launched on its career of Masonic Life.

This was the first Masonic Lodge established in the City of Louisville since Aurora in 1886. Parkland Lodge had been chartered since that time but was not then in the city limits.

The second and fourth Thursdays of each month were adopted for the stated communication and it was found necessary to call two and three special meetings in each month for the conference of degrees so great were theddemands upon the Lodge. Its reputation as an active and prosperous Lodge was early established. September 11, the Lodge became a member of the Masonic Board of Relief. At the time of receiving its Charter its membership had increased to seventy-seven. The Grand Lodge in granting the Charter bestowed a very high compliment upon Suburban Lodge, upon the proficiency of its Secretary, George H. Shaw, for the manner in which the books and records were kept. This was very pleasing to Suburban Lodge and likewise a very high compliment

to the Masonic Widows and Orphans Home, Mr. Shaw having been raised in the Home, an inmate from the age of six years.

The Charter was granted by the Grand Lodge on October 22, 1902, under the name and style of Suburban Lodge No. 740 F. & A.M., appointing A. D. Scott, Master, Edgar J. Ashcraft, Senior Warden, and Theodore Longacre, Junior Warden. The Charter was presented on the evening of October 23rd., by Harry B. Grant, Grand Secretary, acting as proxy for the Grand Master. After the presentation of the Charter, Mr. Grant proceeded with the election and installation of officers, the U. D. officers being re-elected to the offices they formerly held, and the Lodge set to work as a Chartered Lodge.

The Lodge desirous of enlisting the sympathies of its members in the cause of the Old Wasons Home on June 17, 1904, chartered a train on the L. & N. R. R., and furnished its members and their families free transportation to Shelbyville, Kentucky, where they visited the Old Masons Home. Dinner was served by the Superintendent of the Home, at the expense of the Lodge. After dinner the members assembled on the porch where a literary and musical entertainment was given. Harry Barker, of Suburban, presented a free will offering on the part of the visitors, amounting to more than half a hundred dollars. H. B. Shafer, Superintendent, responded. All joined in singing religious and patriotic songs and after having spent a delightful and profitable day, returned home.

January 9, 1905, public installation of officers was conducted by John Maas, Past Master of Preston Lodge No. 281, musical and literary entertainment, and on January 12, 1905, as a token of appreciation of meritorious services rendered the Lodge, Past Master Isaac A. Kelly and John Maas, both of Preston No. 281, were elected honorary members of Suburban Lodge. September 28, 1905, the Lodge donated \$150.00 to the Old Masons Home. January 12, 1906, public installation conducted by Past Master Isaac A. Kelly followed by an entertainment and refreshments, the occasion was one of great pleasure to the members and their families and friends.

February 26, 1906, the Lodge donated \$50.00 for the relief of brethren in San Francisco on account of earthquake.

November 30, 1906, the Lodge changed its meeting place to Fourth and Central Avenues in the South Louisville Savings and Deposit Bank Building, and met on the evening of that date in called communication for the purpose of conferring the Entered Apprentice Degree. Past Master occupied all of the chairs during the conference of the work.

July 27, 1908, the "odge engaged a steamer and conveyed its members, their families and friends to Fern Grove, Indiana, where they spent the day holding an old fashioned picnic. A band of music was engaged for the occasion. The day was so enjoyable that this feature of entertainment became an annual event and is looked forward to in the same manner that children look forward to Christmas.

March 25, 1909, the Lodge donated \$100.00 to the Manual Training Fund of the Masonic Widows and Orphans Home.

September 8, 1910, the Lodge furnished a room in the Old

Masons Home at Shelbyville at a cost of \$75.00.

On May 23, 1912, a committee was appointed to devise ways and means to purchase ground and erect a building for the Lodge. On June 27, 1912, this Committee made its report recommending in substance the formation of an association to be known as Suburban Hall Association, the necessary money to be raised by soliciting loans from the members and any Master Mason who desired to lend sums to the Association, and that certificates of loan be issued payable on or before ten years, bearing 3% interest; the stock of said association with the exception of the shares necessarily held by the incorporators, to be held by Suburban Lodge.

The Lodge, by a vote of fifty to one, accepted the report of the Committee, and concurred in its recommendations, and the same Committee was appointed to form the Association and carry out the recommendations.

The Suburban Hall Association was formed and incorporated under the laws of Kentucky with the following officers: Harry Barker, President, F. M. Marx, Vice President, L. C. Bailey, Secretary-Treasurer, Edward Bloomfield, Corresponding Secretary and Ray Mann, Attorney. The members were solicited for funds and the Lodge turned over its surplus, a let was purchased on the South-east corner of Third and Central Avenues, plans were adopted for a three-story building with stores on the first floor, a hall suitable for entertainments, lectures or banquets on the second floor, and a beautiful Lodge room with the necessary ante-room on the third floor. Bids have been received from eight reliable builders, and from the present outlook contracts will

The year 1913 was especially noted for its many large gatherings and social functions under the leadership of Master L. C. Bailey. The Lodge was kept continually on the move. The Master was continually devising something to interest the members, first conference of degrees by the Grand Officers, then by Past Masters, then by Lewis Lodge Degree Team, and a banquet at the Y. M. C. A., by the Hall Association, then conference of Degrees by the St. George Lodge, banquet by the 3500 Club, winding up the year by issuing a History Souvenir 1902-1913, containing a picture of the proposed new hall, portraits of the officers of the Lodge and all Past Masters, together with those of the Grand Master, Orie S. Ware, George B. Winslow, Deputy Grand Master, T. J. Adems, Grand Senior Warden, J. N. Saunders, Grand Junior Warden.

One of the most interesting events in the history of the Lodge was held January 5, 1914, in the Chapel of the Masonic Widows and Orphans Home, when Grand Master Orie S. Ware, assisted by Grand Senior Warden T. J. Adams, Grand Secretary David Jackson, and Grand Tyler Charles A. Gipe, publicly installed the officers of Suburban Lodge and presented the following Past Masters with Past Master's Jewels: E. J. Ashcraft, T. W. Longacre, Harry Barker, George H. Shaw, Edward C. Stuessy, W. Freeman Huff, E. J. Miller, M. F. Marx, Harry Mitchell and L. C. Bailey.

Grand Master, Orie S. Ware, after installing David Jackson as Grand Secretary, presented the Past Masters Jewels and Grand Senior Warden T. J. Adams installed the officers of Suburban Lodge,

concluding with a musical and literary entertainment.

The Lodge has a Social Club known as the Doric Club, for the purpose of promoting sociability among the members and to advance the interests of Suburban Lodge and Masonry in general.

April 5, 1916, the Lodge dedicated its new home, a hand some two story brick building on the South-east forner of Third and Central Avenues. It is furnished in mahogony. Upon the ground floor the Lodge owns and operates a moving picture show.

About the time of the dedication the Lodge issued a handsomely bound and illustrated souvenir containing a full list of its past and present membership, pictures of its Past Masters and present of ficers, and the four principal Grand Lodge officers.

This Lodge was organized under dispensation December 30,1902. It was assembled by W. G. Thornburg, of Newton Lodge No. 286, who installed the officers and set the Lodge to work.

The Loage was granted a Charter October 22, 1903. L. N.

Hull, for whom the Lodge was named was its first Master.

By authority of a dispensation granted by Grand Master Harry Bailey, June 18, 1902, Price Baird, of Glennville Lodge No. 522, acting as proxy for the Grand Master, organized Utica Lodge U..D., July 5, 1902, with nine members, viz: J. Frank King, J. Frank May, Wm. L. Rouse, T. M. Morton, J. H. Thorpe, W. P. Bennett, W. E. Powell, J. J. Wood, and R. H. Reeves.

J. Frank King was appointed Master, J. Frank May, Senior Warden; W. L. Rouse, Junior Warden; J. H. Thorpe was elected Secretary, W. P. Bennett, Treasurer, and W. E. Powell, Tyler. The Lodge was chartered by the Grand Lodge October 23, 1902. Growth was rapid, there being accepted within six months ten petitions for initiation, and one by demit. The Lodge has had a regular and healthy growth and now has a membership of fifty-eight.

The Loage was constituted in a school hall where its me etings were held until the first hall was built in 1903. A committee began work to secure a suitable hall in November 1902. The new hall was dedicated with appropriate ceremonies in August 1903. Past Grand Master W. W. Clark of Owensboro, acting as proxy for the Grand Master. This hall was outgrown and in 1913 a new building was erected. It with the lot is the property of the Loage. The new building is a two story frame 36x60. The lower floor being used as a town hall and the upper for loage room. The building and equipment cost \$3,000.00.

The Lodge worked under dispensation until Grand Lodge met, the following October, when it was granted a Charter as Island Lodge No. 743, with H. H. Buckley, as first Master, W. D. Everly, first Senior Warden and Richard Simons, first Junior Warden.

When the brethren set about to establish a Loage at this place they were greatly handicapped as to members and finance, and there being no suitable place to meet, it perplexed them greatly, after consulting among themselves they decided to build a hall over an implements store which we under construction, if they could secure this privilege. This done they went to see this owner(B. L. Shacklett), who gladly granted this request. Then it was that they set to work to secure subscriptions for funds consisting of work, timber, money, or anything that could be used in building. They went into the forest(but not of Lebanon) and felled the trees from which this Temple was erected. In the meantime some of the would be members died and some moved away, and they did not have the required members to ask for a dispensation,

their hall and rented it to different secret societies, as well as public gatherings until they were granted their dispensation. Being set to work they met in their new Hall which at best was small and roughly finished with but poor furnishing, buying some of their implements second hand. Raymond Wooten, of Central Lodge, being a good carpenter, made and presented to them an altar which is still in use.

To Harry R. Kendall is due the forethought of instituting a strong Lodge of Master Masons in that section of Louisville, known as the Highlands.

Through his energy and enthusiasm fourteen other Master Masons became interested in the enterprise. Meetings were held and plans laid for organizing the work.

, Shibboleth was selected as the name for the new Lodge. H. R. Kendall advanced the necessary funds to finance the undertaking, after which application was made for dispensation to start the work.

On February 4, 1903, the Commission of Proxy was given H. B. Grant, Grand Secretary and Past Master of Louisville No. 400, to institute the Lodge. After a satisfactory examination before Louisville Lodge No. 400 as to the proficiency of the prospective of ficers, the Grand Secretary as proxy for Grand Master John W. Landrum on March 10, 1903, set the Lodge to work under dispensation, the following names being enrolled as Charter members: H. R. Kendall, J. H. Shrader, Ed. S. Kilgore, L. A. Seitz, P. A. McMahan, John Brunck, H. L. Nevin, J. E. Mann, W. D. Schubble,

J. J. Fields, J. T. Godbey, J. E. Comley, R. E. Hardesty, T. A. Hays, W. L. Stith.

From these were chosen the following officers to serve the new Lodge; H. R. Kendall, Master; J. H. Shraeder, Senior Warden; Ed. S. Kilgore, Junior Marden, P. A. McMahan, Treasurer; L. A. Seitz, Secretary, John Brunck, Senior Deacon, H. L. Nevin, Junior Deacon, J. E. Mann and N. D. Schuble, Stewards, J. J. Fields, Tyler.

A Charter was granted October 22, 1903, and designated as No. 750. On November 3, 1903 Grand Secretary H. B. Grant, as proxy for the Grand Master, set the Lodge to work under Charter. From the beginning the increase in membership has been steady and most encouraging.

The Lodge from the beginning has maintained the practice of rotation and promotion, a new Master being elected each year. Dr. L. A. Seitz, the efficient Secretary, has never had opposition for election.

The Cosmic Club, a social organization composed wholly of Shibboleth members, has equipped a dormitory in the Masonic Widows and Orphan's Home and also enother in the Old Masons Home at Shelbyville, Kentucky. The Lodge has also furnished a room at the first named Home.

Shibboleth owns one of the most beautiful and up to date Loage rooms in the State. It is located at 919 Baxter Avenue and is valued at \$15,000.00.

The property of the Lodge is vested in Shibbole th Hall Association, a duly incorporated body composed of the Lodge

membership. A Board of Directors, composed of nine members, is chosen to manage its affairs, one third of whom are elected annually in open Lodge to serve three years.

The second Thursday in June is set apart as Shibboleth Day when the members and their families gather for their annual picnic.

All fifth Tuesdays are designated "Social Days". On such occasions an open meeting is held when the members and their families gather for social intercourse.

In moving into its new home the Lodge presented its original furniture to a sister Lodge, thus reciprocating a kindness of a sister Lodge when it was instituted.

Each retiring Master is presented with a handsome token in recognition of his services.

Stated meetings are held on the first and third Tuesdays of each month. Visitors always welcome.

On December 12, 1903, C. W. Womack, Past Master of Highland Lodge No. 311, as proxy of Grand Master Owen D. Thomas, assisted by Past Masters B. M. Carr and J. W. Henry, and Richard M. Hamilton, L. D. Carter, H. G. Cottle, Robert McClure and Marian Blair of Highland Lodge No. 311, and G. W. Bailey of Hepburn No. 576, opened a Lodge of Master Masons and installed the following of ficers:

Rueben D. Sparks, Master; John F. Skaggs, Senior Warden; Henry C. McClain, Junior Warden; F. M. Hutchinson, Secretary; W. T. Caskey, Treasurer; James M. Bailey, Senior Deacon; H. D. Logan, Junior Deacon; Henry Hammons, Tyler; I. F. Coffee, Chaplain; Thomas H. Bailey, and P. A. Bradley, Stewards and instituted Elkfork Lodge U. D.

At the communication of the Grand Lodge in October, 1904, Elkfork Lodge U. D., reported twenty-five Master Masons, and was granted a Charter by Owen D. Thomas, Grand Master, to be known as Elkfork Lodge No. 755, and on November 12, 1904, said Lodge was set to work by C. W. Womack, as proxy of Grand Master Owen D. Thomas, with same officers as under dispensation.

Elkfork Lodge No. 755 F. & A. M., is located over a country school building, owns its own hall and has same paid for, and at this time has about two hundred and fifty dollars in the hands of the Treasurer. To Henry M. Hutchinson and Isaac F. Coffee, who are the oldest members of this Lodge we give honorable mention. Henry M. Hutchinson was initiated February 14, 1878, in Hepburn Lodge

No. 576. Isaac T. Coffee was initiated March 17, 1883. Mr. Coffee has served as Chaplain of this Lodge since the date of institution to the present time, except one year.

I. C. Ferguson was the first to be initiated in Elkfork Lodge No. 755. The Lodge received his petition on the day it was instituted under dispensation.

Rueben D. Sparks was the first Master and is Master at this time, having served the Lodge the first three years of its existence and been thrice elected since, making in all six years.

DAYLIGHT LODGE NO. 760
LOUISVILLE, JEFFERSON CO., KY.

On January 16, 1904, Daylight Lodge U. D. was set towork by Owen D. Thomas, Grand Master of the State, under dispensation that had been issued by him on the eleventh day of that month.

The first petition received by the Lodge was from John Thixton, Jr., and eight of the Ten Dollars which accompanied his petition was used by the Lodge in paying for its dispensation. The remaining two dollars was spent in advertising that meeting. At the time of its organization Daylight Lodge was without funds. To provide some working capital for the Lodge, the Charter members agreed to pay their first year's dues in advance. The brethren who organized the Lodge determined that it should pay as it went and that it should be organized along such lines that any lodge thereafter organized in this State, no matter how poor, could follow it with financial safety.

Previous to the first meeting of the Lodge, its new officers were examined in Abraham Lodge No. 8, which extended many, many courtesies to Daylight Lodge and its organizers at the time of its organization. The new officers having be en found proficient in Abraham Lodge by Past Master Charles A. Sommerville, they were ready to be installed in office during that meeting of anuary sixteenth. On that day, the Lodge was opened in ample form at four o'clock in the Blue Room of the Lasonic Temple, by Past Grand Master Owen D. Thomas, acting as Master; Charles A. Sommerville, as Senior Warden; H. R. Candle, as Junior Warden; S. A. Lederman, as Senior Deacon; Z. T. Randolph, as Junior Deacon and Charles A. Dailey, as Secretary, in the presence of a large number of the Masons of Louisville who had assembled to witness the birth of the new Lodge.

Isaac T. Woodson was installed as Master; David W. Gray, as Senior Warden; H. Hoeppner, as Junior Warden; Ernest W. Sprague, as Senior Deacon and J. L. Lisle, as Junior Deacon. Stephen D. Smith, John A. Gray and W. B. Gossett were elected and installed as Secretary, Treasurer and Tyler, respectively.

At this organization meeting, many prominent Masons were present; chief among them, the beloved Bishop Thomas U. Dudley. At the opening he offered a most beautiful prayer for the welfare and prosperity of Daylight Lodge. It was the last time that he ever appeared in public, for within the next week the Grim Reaper had removed him to the Celestial Lodge above. The prayer that Bishop Dudley made on that occasion was quoted all over the country in the various newspapers, for Bishop Dudley was a

national figure and that prayer was one of his best efforts.

At its second stated meeting on January thirtieth the Lodge held a memorial service for Bishop Dudley, during which a beautiful tribute was paid him by Rev. Dr. Powell. The following memorial was adopted and spread on the Lodge minutes.

"BRO. Thomas U. Dudley, Episcopal Bishop of Kentucky, was present at the first meeting of Daylight Lodge U. D., on January 16th., instant, and in a short but forceful speech of congratulations gave what was pertinently referred to as "The Gospel of Masonry". He expressed himself as being glad that accessibility and seasonable hours for assembling would neable him to frequently meet with our Lodge, and after the lodge closed, lingered for a half hour in social conversation with the brethrem, thus evidencing the genuineness of his utterances and the esteem in which he held the Craft - all of which was cordially and unfeignedly reciprocated.

This was the last Masonic gathering our venerable and lamented brother attended, for on the 22nd., instant, Brother Dudley passed to the reward of a well spent life, and his brethren mourn that so grievous a vacancy in the ranks has been made.

we are unable, fittingly, to express the unaffected regard in which our brother was held; nor the shock and sorrow occasioned by his death, but desire that this mark of our Brotherly love and esteem shall be entered upon a page of our records, set apart to the memory of our Brother Thomas Underwood Dudley, who was born in Virginia, November 26, 1837. He became a Mason in 1858,

Was Master of his Lodge, Treasurer of his Chapter, Knight of the Christian Order of Templars and crowned an Honorary Inspector General 33° A. A. S. R.

May his broad views, and kindness in words and acts have indellible impressions that will influence us in the performance of duty and in our associations with men".

This was the third Lodge in the United States organized to meet in the daytime; the other two being St. Cecilia No. 568, organized in 1865, of the State of New York, and the other St. Cecilia No. 865, of Chicago, organized in 1902.

At the second stated meeting of the Lodge, by-laws were adopted and the following honorary members elected: Owen D. Thomas, then Grand Master; Henry B. Grant, then Grand Secretary; Rev. E. L. Powell, Charles A. Dailey and James W. Hopper, Past Grand Master.

October 18, 1904, Daylight Lodge was set to work under its Charter by the Grand officers, to-wit: Owen D. Thomas, Grand Master; R. H. C. Rey, Deputy Grand Master; Past Grand Master, John G. Orendorff as Grand Senior Warden; Samuel K. Veatch, Grand Junior Warden; John H. Leathers, Grand Treasurer; H. B. Grant, Grand Secretary; Rev. James W. Rogers, Grand Chaplain, and Past Grand Master W. W. Clark acting as Grand Marshall. The provisional officers of Daylight who had served under its dispensation were again chosen to serve under its Charter; Messrs. Dolfinger and Stege being the Stewards. Past Grand Master Thomas was presented the gavel with which he had set the Lodge to work and H. B. Grant

was presented with the Master's jewel that had been worn while the Lodge worked under dispensation.

After the Lodge had secured its Charter and number, a seal was selected for it, square in shape, being the only seal of such form in Kentucky.

At the meeting of the Grand Lodge, 1904, J. T. Funk was appointed on the very important Committee on Finance, and it is due to him to state that he reorganized the antequated system of book-keeping then in use by the Grand Lodge.

During its second year the officers of the Kentucky Army
Lodge of Porto Rico had charge of the Lodge one meeting and did
the work, raising Dr. Ellis Duncan, who had been their surgeon
during the Spanish-American war.

In 1905, the year of the earthquake in San Francisco, Daylight Lodge, before assistance was called for by the Grand Master of Kentucky, sent a contribution to the Grand Master of California and it had the honor to be the only subordinate lodge in the State of Kentucky mentioned in the report of the Grand Master of California of the contributions received to aid the brethren in that terrible calamity.

At one of the stated meetings of September, 1905, the Entered Apprentice Degree was conferred upon C. A. Wickliffe by his father, John C. Wickliffe, Past Master of George Washington Lodge No. 265 of New Orleans, Louisiana.

This Lodge has fitted up a room in the Old Masons Home at Shelbyville.

Daylight Lodge has amply justified the hopes of its founders.

From a Lodge of but fifteen members it has grown to a membership of two hundred and twenty-four. Starting without paraphernalia and with practically no financial resources, it has richly equipped itself with all necessary paraphernalia and furniture and has established an invested fund of almost eighteen hundred dollars. It is peculiarily a Loge of young men and it gives promise in the years to follow to be come one of the largest lodges in the State.

FANNIN VALLEY LODGE NO. 763 CLAYTON, ELLIOTT CO., KY.

July 16, 1904, marks the date when eleven Masons having honorable demits, met in an old school house at Famin Valley (Post office now Clayton) Elliott Co., Kentucky, and organized Famin Valley Lodge No. 763. This was a very rude old log house by the road side surrounded by woods and the wilds of nature, with no building or resident nearer than one half mile, and about

ten miles from Hepburn Lodge No. 576, from which six of the eleven came.

The Lodge was opened by J. C. Wells, Hepburn Lodge No. 576, proxy for the Grand Master, with M. E. Waddell, Elliott Lodge No. 653, acting as Senior Warden, M. F. Barker, Hepburn Lodge, acting as Junior Warden, G. M. Jarrell and G. L. Click from same Lodge acting respectively, Secretary and Treasurer, James Goodman of Elliott Lodge, as Senior Deacon, and Pleas Wilson and W. J. Pennington of Hepburn Lodge, Junior Deacon and Steward and Tyler, respectively.

There were present B. F. Fannin, Sr., B. F. Fannin, Jr.,
L. H. Forest and J. T. Fannin, from No. 576, T. L. Dehart, R. L.
Parker, C. D. Mauk, W. R. Wells, L. J. Williams, Reese Leadingham,
P. L. Hollan and R. P. Maddox.

B. F. Fannin, Sr., having been appointed by the Grand Master to be the first Master of the new Lodge, was presented at the altar and installed as such. C. D. Mauk was likewise installed Senior Warden, and L. J. Williams, Junior Warden. The new Lodge as thus organized was then placed in charge of the newly installed Master, and the following officers elected and installed, to-wit:

T. L. Dehart, Secretary, W. R. Wells, Treasurer, and R. P. Maddox, Tyler. The following were appointed and installed—

B. F. Fannin, Jr., Senior Deacon, R. L. Parker, Junior Deacon,

J. W. Wells and P. L. Hollan, Stewards. Charter members were as follows: B. F. Fannin, Sr., B. F. Fannin, Jr., T. L. Dehart,

W. R. Wells, J. M. Wells and R. L. Parker, demitted from Hepburn Lodge No. 576, C. D. Mauk and Reese Leadingham, from Elliott No. 653,

P. L. Hollan, from Morehead Lodge No. 654, R. P. Maddox, from Soldier Lodge No. 708 and L. J. Williams, Highland Lodge No. 311.

A building committee composed of T. L. Dehart, J. W. Wells, and P. L. Hollam, was appointed, and by their endeavors, assisted by the brethren, a hall was erected in which the Lodge held its third communication. Farmin Valley school district was without an adequate building, the lodge and school district by mutual agreement erected a two story framed building, the second story of which is used by the lodge, the first story being used by the district for school purposes. The lodge and school district were both small and in destitute circums tances, so do nations were called for by each and were surprisingly supplied as though the Supreme Architect was superintending the work.

The Lodge began to grow, new members were made until forty-one were initiated and six admitted.

The most notable character in the Lodge was B. F. Fannin, Sr., whomean be justly called the "father of the Lodge". He was born at Elk Fork, Morgan County, Ky., May 3, 1844, initiated June 8, 1891, passed July 13 and raised August 10th., of the same year. He served as Master of Hepburn Lodge No. 576 in which he was made a Mason. Mr. Fannin took upon himself the task of obtaining Charter members and a Charter from the Grand Lodge; laborious as the work was he did not shrink at hardship or yield to discouragements, but persisted with that noble courage which precedes all success. He was re-elected Master in 1905, and again in 1906. In 1907 he declined a re-election and was succeeded by his son B. F. Fannin, Jr., and accepted the Tyler's

place, thus by example showing to the craft that a Mason should serve in whatsoever station his brethren may call him. With the son presiding in the East and the father guarding the outer door, from this post of duty he was called to that Celestial Lodge on High. His death cast a gloom over the Lodge and the entire community. As a man and Mason he was always actuated by pure motives; his advice was timely and good; the principles laid down and practiced by him are still growing in the hearts and lives of those with whom he associated, and especially his Masonic brethren.

In 1908, fifteen Master Masons; one Entered Apprentice.

At a regular meeting of the above Lodge, held on February 6, 1914, the undersigned Master Masons were appointed as a Committee to compile or gather up Masonic history from this Lodge and the old defunct ashler Lodge, from the time of their organization at this place to the present time, for the benefit of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky, and for Masonry wheresoever dispersed throughout this Grand Jurisdiction; Wherefore they beg leave to report the following:

Old Ashler Lodge(now defunct)No. 531, was organized and set to work U. D., on the 31st., day of August, 1872, by Past Grand Master, then Grand Secretary, Hiram Basset.

The Charter members named in the Dispensation and who constituted the three principal officers were, John Frew Stewart, Master; John W. Moore, Senior Marden; Capt. J. Milton Atkeson, Junior Marden; with D. M. Atkeson as Secretary. Only two of the Charter members are now living, viz: John W. Moore and D. M. Atkeson. The first five members to be initiated were John W. Hammonds, Thomas W. Morton, Capt. W. S. Adams, A. B. Salyer and Dr. J. R. Mann. Out of this five, only Mr. Hammonds is now living.

The first Master, John Frew Stewart, had been a Major in the Union Army and lived at Paintsville, Kentucky. He served two terms as Master of this Lodge and then demitted when he received an appointment in the Pension Department at Washington, D. C.,

where he lived till the time of his death. The second Master was Capt. J. Milton Atkeson, who was a Captain in the Union Army, and lived at Salyersville, Aentucky, till his death in 1901.

The third Master was John W. Moore, who joined the fratemity at Lebanon, Virginia, in May, 1867. He served as Master twice in old Ashler Lodge, once in Salyersville No. 769, and once in Wheelersburg Lodge No. 854. He is now a member of Salyersville Lodge. He was also appointed to a position in the Pension Department in Washington, D. C., in 1887, where he worked for nearly ten years. When the administration changed, he was retired to private life, so he again went to teaching school and farming. He has devoted much of his life to school teaching, as he has taught more schools than most any other person in the mountains of Kentucky.

Old Ashler Lodge No. 531, was defunct or the Charter was arrested, in January 1902, for non-payment of dues to the Grand Lodge at the October meeting in 1901. However, during its existence, it made a great many Masons, none of whom so far departered from the ancient land marks of the order as to be guilty of any heinous offense.

Salyersville was for a period of about three and a half years without any Masonic organization existing.

So in June, 1905, some of the brethren of Old Ashler Lodge having made application to the Grand Lodge for a Dispensation to organize a new Lodge at this place, the Dispensation was granted and R. A. Patrick, a Past Master of Paintsville Lodge No. 381.

was made the proxy of the Grand Master to organize the present Logge at this place.

It was organized and set to work Under Dispensation on the 22nd, day of July, 1905, with the following of ficers, viz: John W. Moore, Master; L. C. Bailey, Senior Warden; E. L. Stephens, Junior Warden; A. P. Atkeson, Secretary; Jeff Prater, Treasurer; H. C. Mann, Senior Deacon; John W. Hammond, Junior Deacon; C. D. Sublett and A. T. Patrick, Stewards, with William Adams as Tyler. This Loage continued to work Under Dispensation till the 10th., of November, 1905, when a Charter was procured from the Grand Loage and Salyersville Loage No. 769 was organized by C. D. Sublett a Past Master of Old Ashler Loage as proxy of the Grand Master, with practically the same officers elected and installed as in the first organization.

From that time up to the present, there have beem elected and served as Masters of this Loage the following brethren, viz: John M. Moore, L. C. Bailey, H. C. Mann, A. P. Atkeson, Jeff Prater, John F. Cooper, Dr. R. C. Adams, E. B. Arnett and the present Master, Walter H. May.

As to the personnel of some of the brethren of this Lodge, it is but fitting and proper that mention be made as to their professional, military and civil life. J. W. Moore is a school teacher and farmer; Captain Jeff Prater is a banker, and hotel proprietor: E. L. Stephens is the cashier of the Salyersville National Bank: Judge D. W. Gardner is the present Circuit Judge in the Thirty-first Judicial District: C. D. Sublett is Ex-State Senator of this District, while S. J. Patrick is Ex-Representative:

A. T. Patrick is an attorney at law: W. P. Carpenter and H. B. Arnett, are both successful merchants: W. H. May is a successful farmer: Drs. R. C. Adams, M. C. Kash and W. A. May are all regular practicing physicians: B. W. Higgins has been elected Treasurer off this Lodge five times in succession, while Smith Adams has been Tyler ever since the organization of the Lodge, he is also a farmer.

In 1898, when the call was made for volunteers in the war with Spain, Messrs. Jeff Frater and M. C. Kash went to Frankfort and saw the Governor who gave them authority to organize and muster a Cavalry Troop at this place, which they did. Jeff Prater being Captain and M. C. Kash and N. P. Howard were elected the two Lieutenants. This Troop mobilized and drilled at Lexington, Aentucky, Chickamaugua Park, till peace was made and they mustered out, not having been called for to go to the front.

In the spring of 1913, five members of this Lodge called for and were granted demits from this Lodge to organize a new Lodge at Oil Springs, Kentucky. Captain Jeff Prater, a Past Master of this Lodge, being appointed as proxy of the Grand Master, together with M. C. Kash, also of this Lodge, as Secretary, went to Oil Springs on the 17th., of April, 1913, organized and set to work Oil Springs Lodge U. D., with L. C. Bailey a Past Master of this Lodge, as Master. In September, 1913, the brethren of this Lodge asked for and received a Dispensation from the Grand Master to appear in public and lay the corner stone of the First Christian Church at this place, which was done on the 20th., day of September, 1913, with Walter S. Harkins of Zebulon Lodge No.

273, F. & A. M., Prestonsburg, Kentucky, as proxy of the Grand Master.

There are more my

DUDLEY LODGE NO. 770 ORLANDO, ROCKCASTLE CO., KY.

J. A. Landrum of Ashland Lodge No. 640, proxy for the Grand Master, congregated the following brethren: H. L. Smith, H. C. Owens, L. J. Reames, Solomon Ball, Willis C. Johnson, Rev. Wm. Williams, J. B. Reames, John R. Reames, A. J. Reames, and Rev. W. J. Alcorn, the ten charter members, for the purpose of setting to work Dudley Lodge under dispensation, the dispensation was read by the secretary, and petitions of Mr. Lee Chestnut, T. J. Hayes, E. J. Anderson, and J. N. Deese, were received and referred to an investigating committee. After some interesting remarks by prominent Masons of Ashland Lodge No. 640, the Lodge closed.

On September the 7, 1905, the Lodge was opened for the purpose of hearing report of committee on by-laws, which committee presented the copy of by-laws recommended by the Grand Lodge, a copy of which was read at this meeting, then the Lodge was closed.

On October 2nd., the Lodge was opened in regular communication, the regular officers in charge received petitions for initiation from S. T. Reames, I. R. McCracken and Dr. W. D. Laswell, which were referred to an investigating committee, and the four candidates Lee Chestnut, E. J. Anderson, J. W. Deese and T. J. Hayes, were regularly initiated.

The Lodge made notes to Solomon Ball, J. B. Reames and L. J.

Reames for the amount of one hundred dollars, each, for the purpose of paying for Logge hall, which was in the upper part of a store building.

November 6, 1905, Dave Jackson, proxy of the Gram Master, opened a Lodge of Master Masons, and set Dudley Lodge No. 770 F. & A. M., to work under Charter signed by the following Grand Officers, R. H. C. Rhea, Grand Master; James Garnett, Deputy Grand Master; Samuel K. Veatch, Grand Senior Warden; Henry P. Barrett, Grand Junior Warden; H. B. Grant, Grand Secretary, and dated October 19th., 1905, naming therein H. L. Smith, first Master; H. C. Owens, first Senior Warden, L. J. Reames, first Junior Warden. At this meeting Dr. W. D. Laswell and I. R. McCrackin were initiated, and Lee Chestnut, T. J. Hays, J. W. Deese and E. J. Anderson, passed to the degree of Fellowcraft. Petitions of D. G. Clark and Leslie Clifford, received and referred to an investigating committee, and a warrant drawn on treasurer for thirty-six dollars to pay for the Charter and ten dollars to sid a sick worthy brother.

December 14, 1910, occurred the first death in the Lodge membership, that of Jake Reames, one of the Charter members.

LOCKPORT LODGE NO. 772 LOCKPORT, HENRY CO., KY.

August 17, 1905, J. D. Byrns, of W. G. Simpson Lodge No. 472, as proxy for the Grand Master, R. H. Rhea, assembled the Craft and constituted Lockport Lodge U. D., and set the same to work. The Lodge was chartered as Lockport Lodge No. 772 on October 17, 1906, with a membership of ten. The Lodge has had five Masters, all of whom are still actively connected with the Lodge, Joel Payne, the first Master, now seventy-eight years of age(1914), being one of its most regular and interested attendants.

Chartered October 17, 1906. Charter arrested February 6, 1917, because representative to Grand Lodge in 1916 drew the diem and did not answer roll call, and the Lodge refused to refund the amount. April 25, 1917 the amount was refunded. July 25, 1917, nine men who had been members thereof asked the restoration of the Charter, and it was restored July 24, 1917.

Chartered October 17, 1906. Reports twenty-six members.

PILOT LODGE NO. 779

BIG HILL, MADISON CO., KY.

Pilot Lodge No. 779 received a dispensation to meet and work from James Garnett as Grand Master in the spring of 1906.

It is located just at the foothills and within the shadow of Pilot Knob, a famous landmark in Madison County. After this mountain, it took its name. The honor of being the first Master was deservedly bestowed on Thomas J. McKeehan, who had formerly presided as Master of Kingston Lodge No. 315, and who was instrumental in securing the Charter. He is a merchant and farmer and stands high both as a man and Mason. He has been re-elected Master three times. The other members who have served as Masters are: Mike Parker, Elmer Parker, Irvine A. Hunter, R. L. Ambros.

This little Lodge owns its own hall and its last report to the Grand Lodge showed a membership of forty-one. It has a bright future and should become a source of pleasure as well as a means of service not only to its members, but to the surrounding country.

Chartered October 17, 1906. Reports forty-one members.

Chartered October 17, 1906. Reports sixty members.

LINTON LODGE NO. 783

On December 6, 1906, John D. Shaw, Past Master of Cadiz
Lodge No. 121, of Cadiz, Kentucky, as proxy of the Grand Master,
met with the brethren at the Masonic Hall in Linton, Trigg Co.,
Kentucky, for the purpose of setting to work Linton Lodge under
dispensation. The petitioners were Cullen T. Bridges, first
Master, Albert S. Ford, first Senior Warden, Thomas F. Downs,
Junior Warden, E. C. Vinson, first Secretary, R. L. Nunn, first
Treasurer, W. R. Futrell, first Senior Deacon, W. T. Hargrove,
first Junior Deacon, R. R. Hinson, first Tyler.

A letter was received from Canton Lodge No. 242, with the signature of the Master and Secretary, stating that Mr. Al Little-john had petitioned Canton Lodge No. 242, and after due time he was duly elected to receive the Emtered Apprentice degree. It was his request to receive the degree in the Lodge that was to

be organized at Linton, Kentucky. Mr. Littlejohn was the first to be initiated in the new Lodge. The Lodge worked under dispensation until November 23, 1907, when J. D. Shaw, of Cadiz Lodge No. 121, proxy of the Grand Master, met with the brethren to constitute a new Lodge, which is known as Linton Lodge No. 783, Linton, Trigg County, Kentucky.

The first Hall was over a blacksmith shop, but in 1912 was built a new one over a dry goods store, this one is the property of the Lodge, the first one was rented.

On the 24th., day of June, 1914, the Lodge held a St. John's Day celebration. There was a large crowd in attendance which was put in line and marched to a grove on W. L. Roger's farm where good speeches were heard and a bountiful dinner enjoyed.

There have been thirty-eight men made Master Masons in Lint on Lodge, but there are only thirty-one members now. Some have been demitted, some suspended and one has died.

Lodge to work under dispensation.

October 15, 1907, the Charter was granted and thereafter set to work as such by W. H. Gray, of Pond River Lodge No. 244.

The Lodge takes its name from the rich coal deposits that underlie this whole region of Kentucky.

Its membership is fifty-seven. The meetings are held in a brick metal roof building valued at about \$4,000,00, of which the Lodge is the owner of a one-third interest.

The Lodge in 1916 reported a membership of sixteen.

Hiseville Lodge No. 787, was organized and set to work under dispensation on August 17, 1907, by Judge G. M. Bohannon of Allen Lodge No. 24, as proxy of the Grand Master.

Those petitioning Grand Lodge for dispensation were: James W. Bryant, Joseph T. Winlock, Julius C. Goff, Samuel B. Hatcher, Samuel Gideon Hatcher, Thomas J. Hatcher, William M. Watkins, Edwin Vincent, and John William Pemberton of Rising Star Lodge defunct, of Hiseville, Aentucky, not having affiliated with any

lodge since Rising Star Lodge became defunct in 1880, they were re-instated by the Grand Lodge in 1907.

Other petitioners were, William S. Lain, demitted from Moody Lodge of Texas, John Henry Turk, demitted from Cumberland Lodge No. 413, Burkesville, Ky., W. Maxey Newberry, Candor G. Depp and Ewing L. Palmore, demitted from Allen Lodge No. 24, Glasgow, Kentucky.

The Loage's first of ficers were Samuel G. Hatcher, Master; Candor G. Depps, Senior Warden; Ewing L. Palmore, Junior Warden; Thomas J. Hatcher, Secretary; James W. Bryant, Treasurer; John H. Turk, Senior Deacon; Wm. M. Watkins, Junior Deacon, Wm. S. Lain, Steward and Tyler.

At the meeting of the Grand Lodge in October, 1907, a Charter was granted and on November 9, 1907, was organized and set to work as Hiseville Lodge No. 787, Judge G. M. Bohannon of Allen Lodge No. 24, Glasgow, Centucky, proxy of the Grand Master.

On the morning of October 4, 1911, the room occupied by Hiseville Lodge was destroyed by fire, with all its property but Charter and records.

On November 10, 1911, the Lodge met in the public school building, and continued to meet there for several months.

On November 25, 1911, was begun the discussion of ways and means of securing a more suitable meeting place, and on December 9, 1911, a lot for Lodge room was bought.

On March 9, 1912, a building committee was appointed to erect a Lodge room 26x60 feet.

On October 3, 1912, the new Lodge room was dedicated by

G. M. Bohannon of Allen Lodge No. 24, proxy of the Grand Master.

In the history of Hiseville Lodge there have been four Masters. There were two Past Masters at its organization and both have joined the Lodge above. The Lodge reports forty members.

Beechbottom Lodge No. 788 F. & A. M., was organized and set to work U. D., June 15, 1907, with the following brethren: Alvin Bertram, Master; A. Hial Bertram, Senior Warden; James W. Wright, Junior Warden; Samuel G. Morgan, Secretary; Samuel R. Littrell, Treasurer; James Hurt, Senior Deacon; B. A. Buck, Junior Deacon; James E. Smith, Tyler; Rev. I. R. Rogers, Chaplain. A Charter was granted October 15, 1907, and the Lodge set to work at once to secure a hall in which to meet. The result was a commodious lodge room over the Beechbottom Baptist Church house. The Lodge owns the upper part of the building.

Among her members who have done and are doing much for the betterment of humanity, may be mentioned Rev. C. W. Asbery, Rev. I. R. Rogers, and Rev. Alvin Bertram, the latter besides having been an active minister of the Gospel for more than forty years has served two terms as a member of the Kentucky Legislature.

LILY LODGE NO. 789 LILY, LUAREL CO., KY. Lodge room which so damaged the Charter a new one had to be issued. The old one being kept by the Lodge as a souvenir. This Lodge reports twenty-five members.

CAVE CITY LODGE NO. 790 CAVE CITY, BARREN CO., KY.

Chartered October 15, 1907. Reports thirty-nine members.

HENSHAW LODGE NO. 791 HENSHAW, UNION CO., KY.

Henshaw Lodge was organized June 1, 1907, with H. R. Dyer, Master; A. J. Adams, Senior Marden; G. W. Morris, Junior Warden; S. W. Mitchell, Secretary, W. H. Nunn, Treasurer, W. M. Brantley, Tyler.

The Lodge was set to work by T. B. Young, Jr., proxy of Sam K. Veatch, then Grand Master of Kentucky. Four teen men demitted from Shiloh Lodge No. 453, and placed their demits with petitions to the Grand Master, who had the Lodge set to work U. D., on June 1, 1907. When Grand Lodge met in October, 1907, Henshaw Lodge No. 791 was granted a Charter. Since that time the Lodge has lost two by death, three by demit, one by suspension and how has thirty-eight.

VALLEY VIEW LODGE NO. 792.

Valley View Lodge No. 792 was organized through the efforts

of John W. Moore who had served as Master of Madison Lodge No.

183 eleven years. Both the dispensation and Charter was granted during the administration of Samuel K. Veatch as Grand Master.

He visited this little Lodge March 21, 1907, in person and set them regularly to work. The officers were: John W. Moore,

Master; John A. Young, Senior Warden; W. T. Tudor, Junior Warden;

S. R. Ballard, Secretary; W. J. Dougherty, Treasurer, J. W.

Colston, Senior Deacon; Garland Gibson, Junior Deacon, Joseph Perkins, Steward and Tyler.

John W. Moore was an inspiration to his fellow members and his death in February, 1911, while serving as Master a fourth time was a great loss. He was a kindly, polite gentleman and will be long remembered for his generous charities and kindly ways by all who knew him. Valley View Lodge has had only three Masters besides Mr. Moore. They are: John A. Young, S. J. Jones and S. R. Ballard.

The formation of a Chapter of the Eastern Star among the wives of the members of Valley View Loage has added much to its interest and strength. The Grand Lodge report of 1913 showed a membership of thirty-one. Joseph Perkins, who has from the beginning been Steward and Tyler, is a most devoted member. He has rarely missed a meeting from the beginning, although now nearly eighty years old. He is a cordial, hospitable man, while in voice, manners and looks he is typical of a class fast passing.

WILLIAM MCKINLEY LODGE NO. 793 MCKEE, JACKSON CO., KY.

In the year 1907, the Masons in and around McKee, Jackson County, Kentucky, asked for a Lodge to be held at McKee, Ky. A dispensation was granted by Sam K. Veatch, Grand Master, naming James M. Bailey to be the first Master, Tyra Lainhart, to be the first Senior Warden, and Joab H. Begley, to be the first Junior Warden. The Grand Master also appointed Lee J. Webb, of Pond Fork Lodge No. 601, his proxy to set the Lodge to work under dispensation to be called Wm. McKinley Lodge, U. D., whereupon Mr. Nebb called the Charter members to me et on the 6th., day of April, 1907, in the Odd Fellow Hall at McKee, Ky., and organized the Lodge, with the following Charter members: Dr. W. T. Amyx, Rev. W. H. Anderson, J. M. Bailey, J. H. Begley, W. M. Baker, W. G. Hamilton, Wm. Isaacs, Tyra Lainhart, W. A. Powell, C. C. Powell and S. E. Welch, Sr. There were several prominent Masons from other lodges present as visitors, who assisted in the organization. W. T. Amyx was elected Secretary, S. E. Welch, Treasurer, W. H. Anderson, Senior Deacon, Nm. Isaacs, Junior Deacon, and Wm. Baker, Tyler.

At the next session of the Grand Lodge in October, 1907, a Charter was granted in the name of Mm. McKinley Lodge No. 793.

The Lodge has steadily increased till at present there are forty-three members.

Since the organization of the Lodge there have been only two suspensions and none expelled.

Hancock, Fortitude No. 47, La Grange, Ky .: John W. Stine, Kilwinning No. 506, Louis ville, Ky.; J. Smith Homan, Corinthian No. 542, Greensboro, N. C.

Financial support was pledged by Evan S. Hammond, Charles R. Long, Jr., Charles A. Calvert, John F. Harcourt, Rowan B. Pryor, Alexander S. McFarlan, Wallace Cox and John W. Stine.

A Committee was appointed to secure a lodge room and it leased the second floor of a two story building on the South-east corner of Tulip and R. R. Avenue.

Charles R. Long, Jr., and Evan T. Hammond were appointed a committee to go to Cincinnati, Chio, and buy the lodge equipment and paraphernalia. Everything being in readiness Logos Lodge was set to work U. D. Friday night; January 19, 1910. Grand Master John W. Cowles conducted the Installation ceremony. The following of ficers were installed: Evan T. Hammond, Master; Alexander S. McFarlan, Senior Warden; John F. Harcourt, Junior Warden; Wallace Cox, Senior Deacon; Rowan B. Pryor, Junior Deacon; Charles A. Calvert, Secretary; Isaac L. Munday, Treasurer. The Charter members were as follows: Evan T. Hammond, Alexander S. McFarlan, John F. Harcourt, Charles R. Long, Jr., Rowan B. Pryor, Wallace Cox, John L. Stine, T. J. Hancock, I. L. Munday, J. Smith Homan.

The Lodge had a very successful year, and at the meeting of the Grand Lodge of the State of Kentuckt in October, 1911; a Charter was granted. The second year of the Lodge's existence was one of ups and downs. The third year the Lodge began to get over the rough places. When N. N. Jurey, a member of the Lodge, was erecting a new concrete store building on the Northeast corner of R. R. and Center Avenues, the Lodge appointed a committee to consult with, and get him to build a two story

building with the upper story designed for a Masonic Lodge roomthis arrangement was effected for Friday night November 15, 1912, the Lodge held its first meeting in the new Lodge room.

The organization of a Masonic Lodge was first suggested by Gus A. Knapp, Jacob -saacs and John W. Lautz, in the fall of 1909.

In the same room which is now used by Shawnaa Lodge, there met what was known as the mest End Progress Club. Its purpose was to get improvements for that end of the city, the Club was comprised of men of all creeds, Jacob #saacs being the President and Gus A. Knapp, the Secretary. In glancing over the members present one evening Mr. Knapp remarked to the President that with the number of Masons present a good strong Masonic Lodge could be organized in this rapidly growing section. After due consideration a canvass was made to see how many would be willing to demit from their Lodges to form the new Lodge, and twentyfour names were secured.

On February 2, 1910, the first preliminary meeting was called with Theodore W. Powell in the chair and Gus A. Knapp, acting Secretary.

It was decided to select a suitable name for the Lodge, should a Charter be granted, and the only name suggested was "Shawnee" which was unanimously adopted.

Alfred C. Krieger was chosen to be the first Master; Jacob Isaacs, Senior Warden; Andrew H. Diehl, Junior Warden, Gus A. Knapp, Secretary; Herman Volkerding, Treasurer; Charles Erdman, Tyler.

Albert C. Leisinger present the Bible; George Fisher the Bookmarks; Albert Townsley, the Treasurer's desk; Herman Volkerding, the Charter(\$36.00); E. M. Atherton, cash (\$2.00); Samuel McGee, three gavels; J. M. Denhard, the small carpet; Fisher-Leaf Company, the small stove; Brandenburg, the large clock; Mrs. Alexander G. Knapp one pair of portierrs.

On March 22nd., the Lodge was set to work under dispensation by the Grand Master, John H. Cowles. There were ninety-five members of the fraternity present at the institution of the Lodge.

The first petition received was that of Hinman D. Seeley, dated February 7, 1910.

The first visitor to register was Edwin H. Lotz, of Robinson Lodge No. 266.

Charles A. Erdman was the first to pay dues to the Lodge.

The first meeting of the Lodge took place on March 23rd., the same being for the purpose of appointing investigating committees on 32 petitions.

On August 23, 1910, the members of Shawnee Lodge presented Past Master Charles P. Crowder with a silver loving cup for his faithful services to the Lodge. The presentation speech was made by Herman Volkerding.

On September 13, 1910, Rev. F. C. Whithoff, the first Honorary member, was elected.

On October 19, 1910 Shawnee Lodge was granted its Charter and given the number 830.

On October 29, 1910, Shawnee Lodge celebrated its first social entertainment for its members.

On December 4, 1910, Shawnee Lodge conducted its first Divine Services at the Home. The speakers were Rev. F. C. Whithoff, and Rev. William Mehl. The music was furnished by St. Paul's Church Choir.

Alfred C. Krieger was presented on the night of December 27, 1910, with a Past Master's jewel. This presentation was made by Mr. Volkerding.

On February 6th., Shawnee Lodge was awarded the \$450.00 Piano in the Evening Post Popularity Contest.

On February 14, 1911. Charles P. Crowder was elected an Honorary member of Shawnee Lodge.

The new uniforms for the Master's Degree were worn for the first time on May 11, 1911, when six candidates were raised.

On October 24, 1911, Gus A. Knapp was given permission to organize the Social Club, for the purpose of giving entertainments.

On November 10, 1911, this Club was organized with twenty-six members. G. A. Knapp being chosen the first President; A. R. Klunder, Vice President; J. Isaacs, Treasurer; Wm. Gottschalk, Secretary; J. M. Denhard, John W. Lautz, A. C. Krieger, V. E. Dupre, and I. N. Gray, Trustees.

On November 21, 1911, W. P. Brandenburg presented the Lodge with a large clock.

Theodore W. Powell was the first Charter member to die. He died on January 13, 1912.

George A. Mann was the first Entered Apprentice to die.

On July 20, 1912, the officers of the Lodge accompanied by forty-five members conferred the Master's Degree on seven candidates for Vine Grove Lodge 630, at Vine Grove, My.

On October 8, 1912, Shawnee Social Club presented the Lodge with a check for \$1000.00.

On Wednesday December 18, 1912, a lot was purchased from Elizabeth Gunterman for \$920.00.

R. extended their line from Irvine to Beattyville, Kentucky, and opened up this section for commercial development.

With the advent of the railroad, population and business began to increase, and soon a bustling little town stood on the banks of the Kentucky. Among the original inhabitants and laterarivals were a number of Masons, and they ke only felt the need

of a local Lodge, wherein to gather and draw their designs on their trestle board according to ancient custom. This agitation did not, however, assume a definite shape until the year of 1914, when George S. McDonald, James H. Howell, Charles Phillips, M. L. Baker, W. L. Cart, J. B. McGuire, W. H. Whittaker, L. F. Gibson, C. J. Bolling, Frank M. Smith, W. G. Buchanan, W. T. McGuire, Elias Phillips, Elias Durbin, A. M. Kennedy, J. G. McGuire, John Cecil, H. S. Brandenburg, E. R. Houchin, and Monroe McGuire, on June 22, 1914, petitioned the Grand Lodge for a dispensation empowering them to work as a Lodge of Master Masons.

Their petition received favorable consideration, and a dispensation was granted then, naming G. S. McDonald to be Master, W. G. Buchanan, Senior Warden; and J. H. Howell, Junior Warden.

The Grand Master's proxy being addressed to A. P. Wilson of Proctor Lodge No. 213, Beattyville, Kentucky.

The initial meeting was held in Odd Fellows Hall in Heidelberg, Kentucky, on June 29, 1914, the officers, besides the above named brothers, were M. T. McGuire, Secretary, John Cecil, Treasurer, and W. H. Whittaker, Tyler, Monroe McGuire, Senior Deacon, W. L. Cart, Junior Deacon.

Infantry. I hereby designate Hubert E. Royalty to be

Master, and I. L. Shulhafer, to be Senior Warden, and Wm. A.

Colston to be Junior Warden, of said lodge, each of whom has

been examined by me and found proficient in the work and lectures

of the symbolic degrees of Masonry.

This loage shall be governed by the constitution and regulations of The Grand Loage of Kentucky F. & A. M., and the By-laws and Rules of order as recommended by The Grand Loage of Kentucky F. & A. M., and published in the authorized Book of Constitutions 4th., edition, pages 184-190.

From eighteen officers and privates in the Second Kentucky Infantry, Army of the United States, the Grand Master received the following petition and made the following order.

"TO J. N. SAUNDERS, GRAND MASTER OF THE GRAND LODGE OF KENTUCKY, F. & A. M.

We the undersigned of ficers and members of the Second Kentucky Infantry (now the 160th. U. S. Infantry) having volunteered our services to the country in the war now waged, and being about to depart for foreign lands for active service with the Army of the United States; we, each of us, being residents of Aentucky, Master Masons in good and regular lodge standing, under the jurisdiction of loages subordinate to the Grand Loage of Kentucky, F. & A. M., not disturbing our present relationship to our home loages, hereby ask a dispensation empowering us to meet as a Masonic lodge at or near the military stations of said Regiment of the United States Army and there practice the rights, perform the duties and anjoy the privileges of Masonry; and in said lodge to receive to membership, to initiate, pass and raise soldiers of said Regiment who are residents of Kentucky, who are found worthy and who possess all the requisite qualifications.

All of the aforesaid petitioners being resident of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, Master Masons in good and regular standing, under the jurisdiction of lodges subordinate to The Grand Lodge of Aentucky F. & A. M., and officers and members of the Second Kentucky Infantry, now the One Hundred and Sixtieth United States Infantry, summoned to active military service in a foreign land, not disturbing their present relationship to their home

"lodges, ask me for a dispensation empowering them to meet at or near their military station as a Masonic lodge, and there to practice the rights, perform the duties and enjoy the privileges of Masonry, to receive to membership, to initiate, pass and raise soldiers of said Regiment, who are residents of Kentucky, who are found worthy, and who possess all the requisite qualifications.

The Master Masons who make this petition are the descendants of the home seekers who bearing the rifle, the bible and the ax, converted "No Mans Land" into one of the greatest of all the American States.

Masons of such descent, Masons who voluntarily answer their County's call to patriotic duty, to hardships, to victory or to death are entitled to make such request.

THE DISPENSATION IS GRANTED.

The petitioners are hereby authorized to open and hold a lodge of Free and Accepted Masons at or near the Military Stations of said Regiment to be known as

KENTUCKY RIFLE LODGE

with jurisdiction not territorial and limited to residents of Kentucky in the service of the United States with the Second Kentucky Infantry now the 160th., United States Infantry.

I hereby designate

Major Roger W. Jones to be Master, First Lieutenant Joseph M. Harper, to be Senior Warden, Captain Keith B. Wise, to be

"Junior Warden, each of whom has been examined by me and found proficient in the work and the lectures of the symbolic degrees of Masonry.

This lodge shall be governed by the constitution and regulations of The Grand Lodge of Kentucky F. & A. M., and the By-laws and Rules of order as recommended by The Grand Lodge of Mentucky F. & A. M., and published in the authorized Book of Constitutions 4th., Edition, pages 184-190.

All Past Masters admitted to this lodge to retain such rank therein as though Past Masters thereof.

Given under my hand and the seal of The Grand Lodge of Kentucky F. & A. M., at Stanford, Kentucky, this 25th., day of September, 1917.

On September 25, 1917, upon a high hill, in the open, over-looking Camp Stanley, near Lexington, Kentucky, guarded by military pickets who stood out of sight and hearing, and carefully tiled by two Master Masons, the Grand Master opened Kentucky Rifle Lodge U. D., installed its Master and Wardens, and upon their appointment and election by the Lodge, installed the remaining officers.

MILITARY ROLL OF HONOR, OF LEXINGTON LODGE NO. 1.

Col. James Morrison founder of Transylvania University, and for whom Morrison Chapel is named, served in the Revolutionary war, he was Master in 1794.

Major Thos. Love, also of Revolutionary fame, Master 1795-6,
Gen. Thos. Bodley, Master 1798, served in Waynes Indian Campaign.
Captain Levi Todd, Master 1801, was the hero of the Battle
of Blue Licks.

Col. Jos. Hamilton Davies, Master 1810, was killed at the Battle of Tippecanoe, War of 1812, while Grand Master of Kentucky. Captain N. G. T. Hart was killed in War 1812.

General Wm. Henry fought at the Battle of the Thames War 1812. Gen. Wm. Logan served in War 1812.

Major Joseph Livingston Maxwell was Surgeon in both Mexican and Civil Wars.

Gen. John Moore McCalla, distinguished himself in the war of 1812 and was Master when Lafayette visited Lexington and was entertained by Lexington Loage No. 1, May 16, 1825.

Captain John Neet, served through Mexican War and was Master, 1830, laying the corner stone of the first railway West of Alleganies.

Col. Wm. McKee, Capt. Oliver Perry Beard, John W. Bell, and Dr. Joseph G. Chinn served in the Mexican War.

Warren and Enos Smith.

Devotion, hard work and regular attendance made this little group of loyal Masons worthy of their hire. And on October 22, 1924, they were rewarded for their labors by a Charter given under the hand of Al. E. Orton, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of the State of Kentucky, Free and Accepted Masons and a lodge number of 925.

Ready to work and eager to display the beauties of Glory to the honor of His Holy Name these 15 Charter Members began their labors humbly by building a lodge hall up stairs over the Aurora School House which was loaned to them by the Marshall County Board of Education.

And to them we are indeed grateful for having furnished us a home when we couldn't afford one of our own.

Down through the years this boat traveled with several different captains at its wheel, stopping at many ports and taking on additional passengers

Born to aches our last note of regular meeting at which time a motion was made and seconded that we buy a building site and erect a lodge of our own. This motion was unamimously passed.

What had been a peaceful sea now began to ripple. As the winds blew the storm raged and our debts mounted high as a building site was bought and a building erected.

Our heartfelt thanks go to our building committee, composed of brothers, Hardin, Ross, Dorsey, Hill and Elton Oakley for the untiring labors as they skillfully drew up the plans for a lodge hall and then had them put into effect. Not only to them, but to every member who showed their love and devotion by contributing work and money so their dream might become a reality, we give thanks. And above all to God above for blessing us with this building.

October 23, 1948, the doors were opened to our new lodge building and our first meeting was held. Yes, the debt storm raged high from 1948 to 1950, but true to nature all storms must reach their peak then subside. So has it been with us.

Tonight as brother Joe Cathey, member of Alford

Lodge No. 925 lights the flame that will burn to ashes our
last note of indebtedness, he is representing every member of Alford Lodge, past and present. As we watch
with pride and humble heart the fire that makes the end of

this long and toilsome journey, and as dropping anchor for the first time at home port. Although some of her passengers have laid down beneath the silent clouds of the valley during the journey and can not witness this occasion with us tonight, we feel that they are looking down from their Heavenly Home with as much pride as we are, along with every member of Alford Lodge No. 925 as we give thanks to God for giving us a home of our own, and ask of him that he give us members in the future who will be as loyal as our own, and ask of Him that he will give us members in the future who will give us members in the future who will be as loyal as our present members, and as loyal as our past members have been.

These officers being to assist Brother Petit in setting the new lodge to work. Brother J. R. Bard was elected and installed as the first Master. The installation was held in the Milburn High School with all fifteen Charter Members and visiting Brothers present. Membership was composed of residents of Milburn Community who elected to demit from various lodges of neighboring towns.

After the lodge was instituted and set to work we were very happy to have Brother Mark Hotchkiss of Arlington Lodge No. 582

who was living in Milburn at the time, to assist the Lodge in starting off in a good way. Brother Hotchkiss' work and labors while living among us will always be remembered and as a token of this, the black felt hat that Brother Hotchkiss wore is now a part of the lodge property and hangs in the East behind the Master's chair at all times. Lodge meetings were held in the upper room of a building located near Milburn School until 1938. In 1938 the Bank of Milburn was closed and the Lodge at that time bought the Bank's part of the building. The Milburn Independent Telephone Company owned the room over the Bank's part of the building. The lodge and Telephone Company at this time exchanged tooms; the Lodge taking the upper room and the Telephone Company the lower room.

Brother Cris Cate has loyally and faithfully served the Lodge as Secretary for 28 of the 33 years since Milburn Lodge No. 927 has been instituted.

Regular meetings are held the first and third evening in each month where where harmony has prevailed through the years. The Lodge at this time has 101 members in good standing, having doubled it's membership since 1950. The Lodge is enjoying a good year under the faithful guidance of Brother Cetus Moss, Worshipful Master.

Dunn, demitted from their respective lodges and signed a petition for dispensation to form a new lodge at West Covington, Kentucky, to be known as Good Will Lodge, U.D.

Requests for permission to form a new lodge were sent to Covington Lodge No. 109; Colonel Clay Lodge No. 159; Golden Rule Lodge No. 345; Latonia Lodge No. 746; and Unity Lodge No. 478, Ludlow, Kentucky. All the above lodges complied with this request except Unity Lodge No. 478, which refused. Things looked mighty dark for the petitioners. However, on January 20, 1928, Grand Master Hanson Peterson invited Brother Charles A. Miller and all interested parties to meet with him at the Masonic Temple in Covington, Kentucky, to discuss this matter. After a

refusal to grant permission to form a new lodge would have no bearing on the final decision as Unity Lodge was located in another city. This seemed to create new spirit among the petitioners and on April 23, 1928, a signed petition for dispensation to institute a new lodge with all necessary information was forwarded to the Grand Secretary.

It was on July 2-, 1928, that P.G.M. Orie S. Ware called a meeting of the petitioners in the Knights of Pythias Hall, Parkway and Altamont Road, West Covington, Kentucky, and there as a Proxy of Hanson Peterson, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky, read the Commission of Proxy which authorized the petitioners to constitute a new lodge to be known as Good Will Lodge, U.D. of Covington, Kenton County, Kentucky, to open a Lodge of Master Masons, hold as election for Secretary and Treasurer, install the officers and set to work, according to the Constitution and Regulations of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky.

Shotwell, Jr., Charles Niblack, William Campbell and Roy Youell for the purpose of organizing and obtaining a charter for a Masonic Lodge in Florence the following ifficers were elected to serve in a temporary capacity until such time when their services were no longer needed and the officers of the

In the summer of 1958 Brother Luther C. Scott came to Brother Stanley W. Crawley, Jr. and asked about the possibility of starting a Masonic Lodge in Shively. Shortly after this discussion, there was a rumor that a lodge from the West End of Louisville was moving to Shively. Therefore, it was decided to wait and see if we would have a Masonic Lodge in the area. By late 1959 no lodge had moved to Shively and it was decided to go ahead with plans to form a new lodge.

Brother George W. Stowers took a survey, and reported that there were more than the necessary fifteen Master Masons interested in forming a new lodge. In January 1970, notices were circulated that all Master Masons interested in forming a new lodge meet at the Home of Brother Howard C. Reeves on Feburary 6, 1960. Seventeen Master Masons met that night and decided that the name of the lodge would be Shively Lodge, that it would meet on the first and third Saturdays of each month, and that each Charter Member would pay a fee of \$25.00 to give the lodge some working capital. At each subsequent meeting, additional Brethren attended, signing petitions for affiliation, Butler High School was decided upon as the regular meeting place for our lodge, until such time as we would be able to build a lodge hall.

On March 25, 1960, Shively Lodge No. 951 was set to work under Dispensation. As of that date we had 102 Charter Members. The lodge was set up in the TV Room of Butler High School. There were about 250 interested Masons gathered to see a new lodge born. The officers opeing the Lodge meeting were, Brother John R. Vinson, Jr., Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky, F.& A.M., in the East; Brother C. J. Hyde, Grand Sr. Warden, in the West; Brother Gene Beeber, D.D.G.M., No. 16, in the South; Brother S Albert Phillips, Grand Treasurer, as Treasurer; Brother Al. E. Orton, P.G.M., Grand Secretary, as Secretary; Brother Frank Wood, D.D.G.M., No. 15, as Sr. Deacon; Brother Herbert H. Turley, Master of Sunset Lodge No. 915, as Jr. Deacon; and Brother Earl Wold, P. M. of Suburban Lodge No. 740, as Tiler.

Grand Master Vinson conducted the Dispensation ceremonies, Brother Al Orton installed the new officers with Brother Albert Phillips as Marshal. Those installed were, Stanley W. Crawley, Jr., Master; Edwin R Acree, Sr. Warden; Howard C. Reeves, Jr. Warden; Ray Cook, Treasurer; Richard E. Lyons, Secretary; E. 
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PROCEEDINGS 1856 VERONA LODGE U. D.

Masonic W. & O. Home & Infirmary

OF KENTUCKY.

LOUISVILLE, KY., AUGUST 3, 1911.

To the Masonic Lodges and Brethren in Kentucky:

A committee of Bardwell Lodge No. 499, having sent you a circular complaining that Mrs. Rich, widow of one of their deceased members, was refused admission into the Masonic Widows and Orphans' Home, the lodge urged that, (on its one-sided statement of the case) you would instruct your representative to vote for a change in the former declaration of the Grand Lodge, to the effect that it had no power to compel admissions into the Home, so as to read: "The Grand Lodge has power to compel the Board of Directors of the Masonic Widows and Orphans' Home to admit applicants."

As the almoners of your bounty, and guardians of the three hundred Masonic widows and orphans who are

cared for in your noble institution, duty compels the undersigned to respond.

The Home Directors, with every other Kentucky Mason, have a common interest in the moral and physical well-being of every inmate in the Home. The Directors give their best thoughts, much of their time and considerable money in the performance of the duty devolving upon them, for which they do not and never have received so much as a penny in return. They confidently point to its wonderful success and usefulness, as evidence of the manner in which the trust has been fulfilled. However, they will cheerfully give place to others whenever it shall

be your pleasure to change the management.

The Home is a corporation under the laws of Kentucky, and its government was exclusively committed to a Board of Directors—to be chosen by the craft or its authorized representatives; hence the Grand Lodge, as it formally declared, "has no power to compel" the admission of any applicant. Yet, as a fact, the Grand Lodge has practical control of the Masonic Home, not only because of its influence and high standing, but because its Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Senior Warden and Grand Junior Warden are always members of its Board of Directors. The Grand Master is also a member of every Committee of the Home, and the other Grand Officers are—all of them, on two or more of the committees. Besides this, the Grand Master holds the power to determine who shall or shall not be members of the Board of Directors. But the Grand Lodge in consideration of the power already vested in it, has wisely declared that as a body, it would not undertake to interfere in the management of the Home because it could not be fully advised as to the peculiar circumstances affecting each case. Especially would it be dangerous for the Grand Lodge, or any man or body of men to hear but one side in any case, and upon such one-sided evidence to determine who ought to be admitted or what particular thing ought to be done.

It would be an unthinkable thing, terrible in its results, to admit any one of bad character, or who was afflicted with any contageous disease that would contaminate or in any way injuriously affect the little ones under our care. Hence the most searching investigations are made, and lodges are required to certify to facts set out in blank

applications for admission, and the Board of Directors accept their statements as correct.

Now touching the matter of refusing admission to Mrs. Rich.

Bardwell Lodge No. 499 applied for admission of Mrs. Sarah Virginia Rich, aged 45 years, with her two children, aged 7 and 11 years, respectively. The lodge certified over its seal and signatures of its Master and Secretary that the health of Mrs. Rich was "good," that she and her children were "worthy and in destitute circumstances." Dr. T. J. Marshall, who examined her, certified that she had no heriditary disease or taint; that she had no loss or deficiency in any of her senses; no skin disease; no contagious disease; no deformity of body or limbs; never had St. Vitus' Dance or other nervous trouble; was not addicted to morphine, cocaine or opium habit, or use of intoxicating liquors; never had Epileptic or other fits, small pox or scarlet fever; that she had not now and never had granulated eyelids or any other eye disease, but had been successfully vaccinated, and has had measles and whooping cough. That she is of a good, healthy, sound mind.

Moreover, Dr. Marshall closed his statement with these words: "I certify that I have personally and carefully examined the widow above named and believe the foregoing statements to be full and correct, and recommend

admission to the Home."

A better certificate of good health could hardly have been made, and the Board of Directors accepted the statements of Bardwell Lodge, and of the physician, a member of said lodge, as worthy of entire confidence.

The Board has no desire to decline the admission of Mrs. Rich, whom not one of the Directors knew, but was in her case as in every other application, wholly governed by the conditions of the Home and the best interests of its inmates. This widow was declared by the lodge to be in "good" health; a brother Mason and physician said in writing that he had "personally and carefully examined" her; and, substantially, that she had no disease or heriditary taint or deformity, and was of "a good, healthy, sound mind."

Such a woman, mature in years, and in good health and mental condition, if unincumbered with children, and having as she ought, and it now appears did have, the cordial friendliness of a Masonic Lodge, was deemed by the Board of Directors fully equipped for ample self support, and in-as-much as the Home at that time had more inmates than it had ever provided for at any one time, agreed to receive the children, entertaining no shadow of doubt as to the ability of the widow, thus relieved of every incubrance, to easily support herself, without any great tax on the middle-aged strength of a woman in good health, sound in mind and body. Under such conditions she could not properly be esteemed as being "in destitute circumstances."

The Home has not sufficient capacity, nor has it sufficient income to admit every widow who may apply therefor, but the Board exercises its most sympathizing and best judgment, born of long experience and full knowledge of conditions at the Home, in selecting the most needy and most nearly helpless, so far as circumstances will justify it, to be cared for in the great institution for which and its inmates the Directors are responsible, acting under

a solemn oath of office.

We are of opinion that a lodge makes a serious mistake in urging the admission to the Home, of any widow who can possibly be reasonably near self-supporting, especially if she have children in the Home; because she may prevent a more dependent child or aged widow from receiving its fostering care; the capacity of the Home being limited. Besides, in a few years the children will have attained the age at which they must and ought to leave the institution to take their places in the world at large. If the mother also be an inmate of our Home, her own will be broken up and there will be none to which the children may return, and for which their young hearts yearn.

"Though ever so humble, there's no place like home." We could not be a party to the destruction of the dearest heart's desire for home and mother, unless the unrelenting demands of necessity rendered it imperative. Especially is the "home and mother" idea a sacred thing for young girls of the impressive age fixed for their leaving us. It is also important that boys have such restraining influence on going out into a world from whose temptations they have been shielded. If there are are two or more children in the Home and the oldest reaches the age when she must leave it, the mother, if an inmate, must choose between leaving her younger children and going with the older to fight life's battles at a time when she has grown in years, with weakened capabilities for the struggle and more than herself to struggle for.

Again, young widows at the Home, naturally, are not contented. They are separated from friends and accustomed or desired company. They are restive under necessary restraint where so many are together, and the regulations of the Home are irksome. They are not apt to be willing to consent that their authority over their own children shall be subordinate to that of the Superintendent. In case of petty or more serious contention arising among the children (which is inevitable where there are many together) the mother sides with her own children whose short comings are extentuated, and the mistakes of others are magnified. That is human nature, and the

source of great embarrassment and interference with necessary discipline,

You are invited at all times to visit the Masonic Home and investigate its methods. We respectfully request that your representative be not instructed, but left full to act and vote as the merits

of the case may seem to demand.
